The Olden Days

Glenda Strouse will be displaying items that will show the changes in agriculture in our area for the First Annual History Day celebration. She will have a history of Point Township with period items, articles and maps. Glenda will be on hand all day in King Street Park for discussion and questions.

3rd Battalion Pennsylvania, "The Augusta Regiment"

The 3rd Battalion Pennsylvania Provincial Regiment, "The Augusta Regiment", was originally formed in 1756 to "build, garrison and defend" a fort at the forks of the Susquehanna River. This was Fort Augusta, the largest and longest-lived of all the Pennsylvania Provincial forts, existing until 1794 when it was finally dismantled. It served as a haven of safety for local inhabitants through two wars and the establishment

of the United States.

The re-created Augusta Regiment will be on hand in King Street Park for Northumberland's First Annual History Day. The Regiment will have an exhibit featuring a five-foot square model of Ft. Augusta, built during the Great Depression by WPA workers. Complete in every detail, this magnificent model was saved by the Regiment from probable obscurity when it was seen on eBay and purchased by the Captain.

In addition to the model, members of the Augusta Regiment will be on hand to present programs on 18th Century soldier life. Programs will include a history of Fort Augusta and The Augusta Regiment in the French and Indian War 1756-1763, Fort Augusta in the American Revolution and a fashion show of 18th Century military and civilian dress.

King Street Park will also host a Civil War era garden tea party from 11:00 am to 2:00 pm. This will be a wonderful activity for mothers and daughters! Children will be telling their stories through games of times past and telling you what they've learned through their studies of local history.

A slideshow presentation on local canal history will be presented as well as history on the local railroad. Both of these forms of transportation were extremely important in the building of North-

umberland.

Open hearth cooking will be presented on 18th and 19th century cooking at the home of Dana Ramsey. Directions will be available so everyone can experience her gift of conveying what life was like in those times.

A local American Indian, Dave Ramsey, will present lifestyles of our original resident people. He will also be available for question and answer times throughout the day.

Northumberland is well known for its beautiful blooming azaleas. There will be an azalea garden tour available along with a historic walking tour that will highlight notable homes.

Election 2003: Three Seats, Five Candidates

Three incumbents and two former mayors are vying for three Borough Council seats in the May 20th primary. All are Republicans.

Charles "Bud" Ditton, Judith H. Groninger and Gregory S. Shaffer are all running for re-election to a new four-year Council term. Ditton and Shaffer have served on Council since 1998; Groninger, since 2000. These incumbents face Robert Stahl and Wendell Wetzel in the primary.

Stahl is a retired Council member, and mayor. Wetzel was elected Northumberland's mayor in 1998, and served through the end of 2001.

The top three Republican vote getters will have their name added to the fall ballot. With no announced Democrats on the ballot, these voters can nonetheless write-in any of the announced candidates. The top three vote-getters will have their name included on the

November 4 ballot.

Voting commences at 7 a.m. and ends at 8 p.m. on May 20th. Those registered voters in Ward 1 vote at the Borough Building, while Ward 2 voters go to the Girl Scout House. Those in Ward 3, vote at the Kiwanis Building.

New Walking Tour Brochure Debuts

A new brochure featuring a self-guided walking tour of Northumberland will make its debut at History Day on May 10, 2003. The brochure is a joint project of the Northumberland County Historical Society and the Friends of Joseph Priestley House. Local researchers from both groups compiled information about properties of historic and/or architectural significance predominantly within the Historic District of Northumberland. The district was mapped in the 1980's by Thomas R. Deans of Dean's

Associates, Milton, as part of the nomination process to place a portion of the borough on the National Register for Historic Places.

The brochure describes points of interest for numerous private homes, businesses and public facilities on the walking tour route. Photos of many of the properties are also shown.

Funding for the brochure was provided by the Degenstein Foundation, Northumberland National Bank and the Friends of Joseph Priestley House. The

brochure is free.

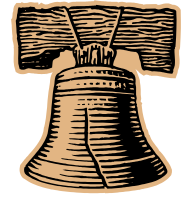

can Civil War. Captain James Taggart and The Taggart Guards of Northumberland did not achieve great fame in the war, but their service and their sacrifices deserve to be remembered. They fought on some of the bloodiest battlefields of the Civil War, and when they came home to Northumberland, the veterans became a vital part of the community.

Civil War historian John Deppen will discuss the history of The Taggart Guards, later known as Company B of the 5th Pennsylvania Reserves from the

Riverview Cemetery on Seventh Street during the History Day celebration. He will highlight the stories of other Civil War soldiers from Northumberland who traveled far from home and saw unspeakable carnage in the great struggle to preserve the Union at 10:30 am, 12:30 pm and 2:30 pm.

Fiddler of Tunes and Purveyor of Tales

Back in the old days, the itinerant fiddler brought much of the music and entertainment to an area. Traveling in a circuit, the fiddler would show up at a house ready to move in for a spell. The neighbors were

told, the barn floor was swept, and the dancing shoes were polished.

Beverly Conrad is a folk fiddler in the truest sense. Armed and eared with hundreds of familiar tunes, she winds her way through crowds fiddling one tune after another. There's nothing like a good story and so much the better if it has a song to go with it. Since moving to Pennsylvania in 1987, Bev, also known as the Fiddler Woman, has made a point of finding out all she can about the songs and legends of the Keystone State. Her lively presentation,

West Nile and Mosquitoes

Spring is here and warm weather is on the way. With warm weather come the bugs and disease-toting mosquitoes. We can help reduce the number of mosquitoes in residential areas by draining or eliminating mosquito breeding sites. Mosquitoes only breed in still or stagnant water. You should eliminate any objects on your property that might contain small pools of standing water. (Don't forget clogged rain gutters!) Avoid or limit outdoor activities at dawn and dusk, when mosquitoes are most likely to feed. Consider applying insect repellent when you need to be outdoors.

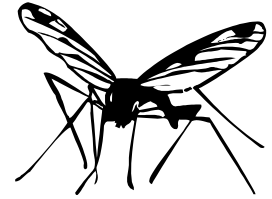

Area grocery stores now have available irradiated ground beef, which we consider a major step forward in preventing food-borne illness. Irradiation does not alter the flavor, or glow in the dark or daylight, or contain

any traces of radioactivity. Sure Beam, the company providing the service, employs a process using ordinary electricity to help eliminate the threat of harmful food-borne pathogens such as E. Coli, Salmonella, and Listeria, in a wide range of foods from ground meat to poultry and produce, whether fresh or frozen.

Irradiation of food is not new. The first patents for food preservation based on irradiation were issued in 1905. Astronauts carried sandwiches made with irradiated ham, cheese, and bread aboard NASA's Apollo 17 in 1972. More than 40 years of research have determined the effectiveness and safety of irradiation of food and other products. By 1997, more than 75 million pounds of spices, herbs, dehydrated vegetable products, and seasoning blends were irradiated in North America. The irradiation process is also used in disposable medical devices, consumer products such as

baby bottle nipples, cotton balls, bandages, and cosmetic raw material. The FDA approved the process in 1997; while the USDA's approval to reduce or eliminate food-borne pathogens in fresh and frozen red meat took effect in 2000. Currently, over 40 countries enjoy commercial irradiated foods. For those who enjoy a rare or medium-rare burger, it is deemed to be safe when using electronically pasteurized food. A word of caution – electronically pasteurized products must be handled as you should handle any other perishable food item. Just as pasteurized milk must be handled and stored appropriately, electronic pasteurization helps to assure that safe foods are available in our supermarket. The consumers must also do their part to keep foods safe at home. For more information, visit www.surebeamsafe.com or www.foodsafetycouncil.com.
