Another 'Splash' coming June 3

Summer is coming, believe it or not, so Liberty Splashland is planning some new and fun things for your family to enjoy this 2004 season. If the funding is secured in time there will be a new 1200 square foot spray ground for your younger ones to enjoy. This will be a totally enclosed area with a grassy area for lounge chairs that you parents can enjoy while watching your kids. The dump tower will be painted the red, white and blue color scheme like the rest of the park. The Big Squirt squirt gun system will also be installed with the squirt guns available for purchase at the Liberty Café. Our second annual Liberty Fear Factor Day will be one of the kickoff events for Pineknotter Days on Saturday July 3 at 4PM. This is similar to the popular TV show with two stunts and something gross. It was a blast last year! Merle Phillips grandson Nate won the adult division

last year. If you haven't taken the time to visit Liberty Splashland or if you didn't even know it exists then you are missing out on some fun times right here in your back yard. Liberty Splashland boasts the only drop slides in the area, the only Dump Tower, the only Big Squirt system, sand volleyball, 100 lounge chairs, pool tubes, the largest community swimming pool, a great menu, swim lessons, Northumberland/Sunbury swim team and now a children's spray ground. Special events include the ever popular lip sync contests, Liberty Fear Factor Day, and splash hops. There are special events every other week all summer long. Liberty Splashland is your source for summer fun. Passes can be purchased at the Borough office now or at the park after opening day June 3. Season pass rates are \$75 for an individual and \$150 for a family. The park is available for rent and birthday parties.

Call the park after opening day for all the details. Funding is still being sought for the water park concept. The future of Liberty Splashland includes such things as 2 waterslides that will be nearly 300 feet each, a new bath house, all new decking, a lily pad walk, a new spray ground and either the Flow Rider boogie boarding activity with lazy river or a huge water playground with 1000 gallon dumping bucket. The purpose of this Aquatic center is to bring people here from other communities to use our facility just as other communities are doing all over the country.

This isn't a park created just for the residents of Northumberland but a regional park that would draw 25,000 to 40,000 people each year. The awesome thing is we have the numbers to prove it. We hired the best in the country to see

Once again, Furman Foods will have a display of their family and company history. They will exhibit machinery used in the early days of the cannery as well as interesting items which will surely interest one and all!

lesson on your ride to the Lloyd/Johnson Mill House where you will enjoy many activities! Transportation will be provided on the hour from King Street Park.

Dana Ramsey is a historian/instructor on Open Hearth Primitive Cooking and she will be doing a demonstration in her 1820c home along Lodges Run in Point Township. She will give visitors a feeling of being transported back in time to experience the sights and smells of an 1800's kitchen. Visitors will also be able to see how their foremothers cooked their family's meals such as roasted duck done on a string, roast beef roasted in a reflector oven, corn chowder, pies and sweet cakes baked in a tin kitchen and Dutch-oven.

In addition at the Ramsey home, weather and conditions permitting, visitors will be able to ride a stagecoach and experience what this form of travel was like for the early settlers. Imagine, riding a stagecoach traveling through the Central Susquehanna Valley!

Sidewalk Project Continues

The Borough's sidewalk beautification project continues this summer with the following deadlines quickly approaching:

2nd Ward

Property owners in the 2nd ward are subject to fine and other penalties for not complying. The deadline for property owners in this ward has passed.

3rd Ward

Property owners in the 3rd ward (those voting at the Kiwanis Building) have until **October 31** to fully comply with this project. After October 31, owners who fail to comply will be subject to a fine and other penalties.

1st Ward

Property owners in the 1st ward (those voting at the Borough Office), have until July 1st to seek a 1-year extension or total exemption. The date to comply is October 31 or October 31, 2005 for those seeking an extension.

Forestry Grant

The Northumberland Beautification Project began in 2002 to enhance the southern entrance into the Borough of Northumberland. Volunteers worked to clean out weeds and debris along a section of Route 11 leading into the Borough.

Last year, the Borough was awarded a \$4,000 grant from the Northeast Pennsylvania **Urban Forestry** Program to purchase trees and shrubbery. The Forestry Program and Penn State Cooperative Extension provided assistance in choosing the species of trees. Flowering crab apple trees, Douglas fir, and pin oak trees have been planted around the Sewer Authority fence line by the Borough Crew. Additional trees and shrubbery will be planted in an area near the railroad underpass this year.

From The Health Officer

Hurrah! Spring is here and now that we are cleaning up the winter mess, it is a good time to also eliminate things and places where water can collect and create breeding places for mosquitoes. West Nile virus infection is a disease we don't need.

Picnics and eating out are the norm with summer. Remember – HOT foods hot (135° or above) and COLD foods cold (41° or below). No food should sit out unprotected and should be placed under proper temperature within two hours. In extreme heat, this time should be much less than 2 hours.

Always use clean utensils and wash hands. If hand washing is not possible, there are now hand sanitizers that can be substituted for hand washing; use them. Time and temperature are also considerations

we need to remember when we take a "doggy bag" from a restaurant. If we make a few stops on the way home, we may bring home more than we started with: spoiled food and the makings of food borne illness. If you think you may be bringing food home, carry a small cooler with an ice pack. This rule also applies to perishable food you get at the grocery store.

Speaking of restaurants, etc... If you observe incorrect food handling in a restaurant, deli or grocery store, it should be reported to management and if necessary reported to the local health department. The new food code forbids handling ready to eat food with bare hands.

Food Service Training for Volunteers

In our last newsletter, we outlined the new Pennsylvania Food Codes. As ture come to our area to a result of the new codes, there are now options available to volunteer groups such as churches, fire companies, etc. This nal examination. (All includes any group who qualifies as a tax-exempt

REMEMBERING DOWNTOWN NORRY

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EARLY NATIVE AMERICAN LIFE

David Ramsey is a Mohawk American Indian who educates the public on early Native Americans who lived in our area and writes for Susquehanna Life Magazine on Native Americans. He will be talking to visitors about local American Indian Life and also explaining the specific interest of his particular home and surrounding areas of European influence.

THE AUGUSTA REGIMENT

Third Battalion Pennsylvania, The August Regiment, will encamp at David and Dana Ramsey's home from Friday evening through Saturday. Representing Colonel James Burd's company who built and garrisoned Fort Augusta, the group will demonstrate 18th century military camp life, cooking, camp crafts and military drill as it was during the French and Indian War in our area (1756-1763).

Commanded by Captain

Michael Slease of Milton, this living history group is composed largely of men and women from the Snyder, Union, Northumberland County area, with some members from Maryland, New York and North Carolina. Using primary documentation from journals, publications, military manuals and items of material culture along with many years of practical interpretive work, the members of Burd's Company represent and honor the men, women and families who involved themselves in various ways with the British provincial army of the period.

HISTORICAL CHARACTER DEPIC-TIONS

Reuben Haines was a Quaker brewer, merchant and land speculator during the last quarter of the 18th century. Murray Strausser, formerly of Northumberland, will interpret Mr. Haines as a visitor to the canal master's home at the lock house at the Ramsey's home.

On April 7, 2004, the Northumberland Borough Council approved a measure that will ultimately decide the future of the former Second Street School Committee. By a 4-3 vote. If this funding is not forthcoming by the end of September. if it would work here and it does. Why not take advantage of the opportunities we have to better our community and make it more visible to other people. Those that use the park will pay for whatever debt service would be needed for matching funds through their admission fees. We are trying to take advantage of the national trend to create a positive cash flow by turning the "community pool" into a place where people want to go to have fun and to get wet and spend their

money. Personalized bricks are available toorder at \$50 for a 4x8. \$100 for an 8x8and \$250 for a 12x12. Orders will be placed when 25 bricks are ordered. Some additional funds are being sought for the spray ground. Your support will help to automate the jets to shoot water out of the decking in a random pattern. Only \$3,000 in additional funds is still needed for a programmable controller. We have made every effort to provide the best for your dollar when creating these new features. For example, Lewisburg has recently unveiled their plan

for a new community pool. They plan to spend \$750,000 for their upgrades. With the addition of the spray ground, we will have spent, over a total of 3 years, less than \$40,000 for very nearly the same features and square footage. We hope you enjoy the park and take advantage of all it has to offer you and your family. For a summer of fun, variety and, at a very reasonable cost, come to Liberty Splashland on Prince Street between Front Street and Second Street. Hope to see you this 2004 season!
