Beginning June 2, Northumberland Borough will institute a curb side yard waste recycling service. This schedule will provide service to each homeowner once a month and will be offered during the months of June, July, August and September. The material collected will be shredded into mulch which will be made available to the residents of Northumberland Borough free of charge. Later editions of the Pineknotter News will explain where and how borough residents will be able to pick up the mulch.

Material to be picked up: Yard waste from trimming trees, bushes and plants. All trimmings are to be tied up or in trash type containers ready for dumping; *no plastic bags*. Do not use wire or metal materials to tie bundles; bundles must be able to be cut open with a razor knife. Bundles may not be heavier than 50 pounds.

The yard waste is to be placed on the sidewalk side of the curb and ready for pick-up NO LATER than 6:00 a.m. on the scheduled pick-up day. DO NOT PLACE ANY MATERIAL IN THE STREETS.

The Street Department will not spend more than **10 minutes per residence** and will not be permitted to enter yards to pick up brush.

Northumberland Borough is not providing any drop off location for yard waste.

TIRES AND PORCHES

You might be wondering what tires and porches have to do with one another!

Well...these are two issues of concern in keeping our town clean and beautiful. If you walk or drive through the borough, you will notice that many homes have a tire or two (or 5 or 6) on a porch, leaning along side the house, in the yard, etc. These are an eyesore. They become the breeding ground for mosquitoes when water accumulates in them. In other words, they should be removed or at least placed in a garage or shed.

Our code department frequently has to notify homeowners about "stuff on porches". It is springtime and a time to enjoy porch-sitting and lemonade-sipping!! Porches are not to be used for storage of non-porch items. You may not have "inside" furniture on an outside porch. This means no upholstered chairs, sofas, or loveseats should be outside. This also includes desks, tubs of yard sale items, garbage bags, bags of recyclables, and so forth. Please keep your porches neat. It makes YOUR home look better and benefits the whole neighborhood.



WHAT WILL THE KIDS DO ON SUMMER VACATION? HOW ABOUT SUMMER HISTORY CAMPS?

The Friends of Joseph Priestley House and the Northumberland County Historical Society invite children in first through fifth grades to our annual co-sponsored Summer History Camps, to be held July 23-25, at Priestley House and August 4-6 at Hunter House/Fort Augusta.

This year at Priestley House, campers will help solve "Joseph Priestley House: A History Mystery". The mystery is: how did Joseph Priestley's home become a museum?



At Hunter House/Fort Augusta, campers encounter "Native Americans in the Susquehanna Valley", by hearing about Pennsylvania's frontier at the Native American village of Shamokin—present day Sunbury—through artifacts, structures and a meeting with Susanna Hunter, wife of Colonel Hunter, who lived at Fort Augusta. Other guests will include storyteller John Moore, Captain Michael Slease of the Augusta Regiment, and Native



American speaker David Blackbear Ramsey. Each will share information about local life in the 1700's. Crafts, snacks, and photos of campers in costume will be part of the three day experience.

Sessions will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon each day of camp. Registration is required by July 11. Cost is \$35 per camper per week, but the excitement of coming face to face with the past is lasting, and priceless. Enrollment will be limited and is on a first-come, first-served basis. COMPREHENSIVE PLAN PUBLIC MEETING SET

Work continues to develop a new multi-municipal comprehensive plan for Northumberland Borough and Point Township. The committee of residents from both communities has been meeting on a monthly basis with professional planners from Gannett-Fleming, Inc. The first public meeting was held on October 1, 2007 for residents' comments. A second public work session is scheduled for Monday, June 9 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Kiwanis Building on Prince Street.

The study includes a variety of topics such as transportation, industry and commercial businesses, agriculture, historic preservation, community services, education, recreation, infrastructures, and trends in demographics, housing and economics. Once a final draft of the plan is complete, the Northumberland Borough Council and the Point Township Supervisors will take action to approve the plan so it may be implemented.



Liberty Splashland, what is it? Well it's right in your back yard. No, don't go to the window and look. It's your community family aquatic center on Prince Street. If you haven't heard of it you are among the few in town.

We, at Liberty Splashland, don't want to be known as the best kept secret in Northumberland. The park is a relaxing place right here in town to have fun getting wet by going down the drop slides, doing a cannonball off the dive into 12' of water, swimming laps, getting sprayed with your kids in the Spray Zone spray ground, getting soaked by the Dump Tower or just lounging on a tube in the pool. There are lounge chairs for you to soak up the sun, sand volleyball and some of the cheapest concession foods you will find anywhere like cheese sticks, chicken fingers, fresh fruit cups and bottled water.

This year's project is the continuation of replacing the concrete decking in front of the dump tower to maintain a nice smooth place to walk. We will be continuing to upgrade the deck and the pool edge over the next couple of years and have some plans for increased lounging areas and separate eating

Hours of operation are 12:30 pm to 6:30 pm every day (see our weather policy at the park) from the last day of school until the Sunday before school starts at the end of August. Lap lane swim is from 12 noon to 12:30 daily. There are 6 lap lanes available and typically only one person comes to do laps. This is a good time to get in some exercise without the distraction of kids.



Admission rates are the same as last year at \$4.00 for general admission, \$2.00 for senior citizens and children 5 and under free. All rates are 1/2 off after 5pm. The season pass is always our best value at \$80 for an

If your group or organization wants to come to the park either during normal hours or as a private party after hours, we are equipped to handle up to 200 additional people at the park and have picnic facilities at the rear of the property. While Liberty Splashland is clearly not a resort, we do have more to offer than any other community pool in the area. Our diverse water features and natural setting create a comfortable and fun atmosphere just a few minutes from your front door. Take advantage of all we have to offer this summer.
