
THE LITTLE BOROUGH THAT COULD

Apparently, time has the ability to repeat itself? As I looked over previous newsletter articles, I found one from 2006 had exactly what I wanted to say today. Like me, you may not remember the name of the particular storm, but we had some bad weather in the early summer that year. On the

right are the major thoughts from that article.

My next point is something that I cannot emphasize enough. The Northumberland Fire Department, including the Fire Police is actively seeking volunteers! The NFD is an ALL-VOLUNTEER organization and has been for over 200 years! We actually have one of the oldest fire companies in the country. What a great history!

I often hear the conversation trail off to, "Well I'd help out, but......." I'd love to find a way to eliminate the "buts"! Certainly we are looking for ablebodied men and women to become active firefighters. That part of the job is dirty, tiring, and physical, no masking that.

We are, however, in need of assistance on all levels and from people in all walks of life. Looking for a job that is just slightly less physical? The Fire Police is for you. Have mechanical skills or trade skills? Our equipment and facilities need maintenance. Are you a numbers person? Assistance and creative ideas for fundraising activities and our social clubs are always welcome. An admin-minded individual could fill one of the two expected vacancies on the Emergency Services Board.

Even if you can't walk and chew gum concurrently, can burn water, and think a smoke detector is actually an oven timer, we have need of your help! If you can hand someone a cup of coffee and offer encouraging words, we have a place for you in the NFD! You can contact either of the fire companies, the fire police, or the Borough Office. We are a very dedicated team. The NFD responded to nearly 40 calls for help during TS Lee with just 17 volunteers, and not really more than 10-12 members at any one time. That's a lot of work for a few hands.

Speaking of dedication, I just want to give a hearty THANK YOU to all that helped out thru the recent storm. Especially the Borough officials, the Police and Street Departments, Point Township Police, Fire, and Fire Police Departments, the list goes on with too many to mention and my apologies to anyone I missed. We took many calls at the firehouse from residents who wanted to know what they could do to help. The outpouring of help was great! Again, THANK YOU!

STORM NOTES FROM THE DEPUTY FIRE CHIEF

If you know you get water please, please take steps to help yourselves out in these situations. There are fixes for rainwater runoff that enters basements, some of them are inexpensive.


Budget to purchase a sump pump and check it occasionally to ensure it is working. If you're unsure of how your equipment will perform due to its age or condition, purchase a back-up pump and have it on hand incase your existing pump fails. It's often easier (and cheaper) to find one on a sunny summer day.



Other relatively easy fixes would be to ensure that rainspouts are connected and directed away from your home as much as possible. Of course they only function correctly when they are free of blockage. Sometimes re-grading of the lawn surrounding your house can have a beneficial affect on wet basements.

Ask your heating equipment provider if your home heating equipment can be raised off the floor, even if only by a few inches. This includes boilers and furnaces, water heaters, and home heating oil tanks. For houses in the flood plain strapping heating oil tanks and water heaters down is also desirable.

Just like it is a homeowner's responsibility to ensure the sidewalks are in great shape in front of their homes, they need to take responsibility for emergency preparedness. It's a simple matter of helping us help you. We would NEVER deny anyone services, but I can tell you that during our most re-



cent rainfall we had to prioritize our responses and we simply couldn't get to everyone. We are struggling for manpower and have to use the same folks to pump basements that would also be responding to other various emergencies of a more severe nature. So please, please, put some of these items into your budget plan as well as your own "honey-do" list."

DID YOU KNOW?

Before railroads were built Northumberland was a center for stage travel. In information from a newspaper clipping in 1924, we learn that a four-horse coach arrived and departed every day for Harrisburg and one for Pottsville, one to Williamsport, and one to Wilkes Barre. Also, there were two-horse coaches to Water Street, via Centre County, where you could make a connection to Pittsburgh.

A.E.Kapp (Kapp Heights) was one of the most well known stage proprietors of that time. He had 100 horses, a black-smith shop, harness shop, and a paint shop. He employed a large number of men in his businesses. His coaches were known to be very clean and guided by very capable drivers.

LOOK UP, LOOK DOWN, LOOK ALL AROUND...

...your property! As a property owner you are responsible for ALL of it. Many times we fail to take a good look at what others can see. We receive many complaints regarding lack of upkeep for some homes. If your yard continues to a back "alley" be sure to maintain all trees and bushes that overhang that alley. Look up to be certain that these trees and shrubs are not going to hit passing cars and trucks. There

are times when emergency vehicles are hampered by overhanging branches.

Next, trim back any plants that obstruct walkways. Pedestrians should not have to move off of the sidewalks in order to pass by.

If you have a hillside that abuts a street, keep the grass, weeds, and shrubs cut so that they do not grow onto the roadway or into passing vehicles.

In this current economic climate we are see-

ing an ever increasing number of foreclosed properties. Please understand that it can be very difficult to determine who is responsible for maintaining these homes. At times it takes 3 to 4 YEARS for some of these homes to become available for sale. If you have a home in your neighborhood that is not being maintained please let us know. Often times we are not aware that something has occurred.

Finally, our most sincere thank you goes out to all of you who do a great job of being good caretakers!

BOROUGH HOUSEKEEPING

Leaves are picked up before the snow flies, but not before 80% of them have fallen including the late drop trees.

The borough will be recycling the leaves into mulch. Leaves must be placed between the curb and sidewalk, *please not on the street*. Leaves on the street can freeze to a huge mess with rain



or snow. The frozen leaf pile can quickly break a snow plow that unsuspectingly hits them. And that means your street along with everyone else's will not have snow removed until its fixed, which can take days when waiting on a part. FYI: Grass clippings are not to be placed on the street at any time.

Check your street cleaning sign as to the day of the week the leaves will be picked up. *Final collection will be the week after Thanksgiving.*

However, branches cannot be put out with leaves for pickup. The branches can block and even break the vacuum. Both of which delay leaf pick up, either for other properties on that day's route,

or for everyone until repairs are



Failure to remove snow/ice from sidewalks will result in a fine. Property owners have 24-hours to remove snow and ice from sidewalks.

Heavy snowfall is always a headache. It would be helpful when a

storm is imminent if larger parking areas are kept free by grouping cars together. In this manner, the plow can clear larger spots at once. As areas are cleared, cars can then be moved to allow clearing of the remainder of the street. Snow may not be thrown on the street. The street department appreciates your cooperation.
