

ON BEING A GOOD NEIGHBOR

High Grass — grass can be no higher than 6" within the Borough. Tall grass is unsightly, can hinder sight when along streets and alleys, and can harbor rats and other animals that can cause health issues.

Grass Clippings — please keep clippings off sidewalks and streets. The ordinance was put in place as the clippings can cloq up storm drains.





Dogs and Cats — The Borough Ordinances state:

- No person shall leave food for dogs or cats outside unattended.
- Dogs can not make continuous noise for more than 10 minutes. (An often heard complaint.)
- Dogs must be leashed and curbed. (For those who are like me and didn't know what curbed meant—you must clean up after your dog or possibly face a \$300 fine, plus costs!)

Please try to be a good neighbor and citizen. If I wanted to clean up dog poop—I would have a dog! SO PLEASE CURB YOUR DOG!

BOROUGH NO PARKING ORDINANCE

FYI: On Federal holidays, tickets will NOT be issued for parking in Borough regulated No Parking Zones, often inaccurately referred to as

No Parking for Street Sweeping.

However, the No Parking Ordinance is a year-round ordinance for multiple purposes including leaf and snow removal in addition to street cleaning.

No tickets will be issued along detour routes in regards to the No Parking Ordinance.

Bloody Springs Reenactment — August 20, 2017

On a hot summer afternoon in August of 1756, young James Pattin was guarding cattle near Fort Augusta and he suddenly encountered Indian warriors. They shot and scalped him. His blood ran into the spring to which he had come to quench his thirst and was henceforth known as the Bloody Spring. On Sunday, August 20 at 2:00 p.m. this event will be re-created at the site of the Bloody Spring on Memorial Drive just off Shikellamy Avenue in Sunbury. The cast will include members from the community and the Augusta Regiment. Spectators are invited to witness the event in the area near the tennis courts. The Northumberland County Historical Society will provide refreshments after the re-enactment at its headquarters at the site of Fort Augusta. All are welcome to attend.

History Harvest — September 21, 2017

Students and librarians from Susquehanna University will be here to do brief oral history interviews and photograph items as part of an ongoing local history project begun at the University last year. We're asking you to start combing the house now for that special item that has an interesting story. 
PPL will be installing new transmission lines at various locations.



Improving a Health, Human Service Helpline

To help residents better access both private and public human services, House Bill 211 passed the House this week to improve Pennsylvania's 2-1-1 system. The 2-1-1 system is a free, confidential, 24 -hour information and referral service provided by the United Way that connects Pennsylvanians in need with health and human service assistance available through government programs, along with private and nonprofit organizations in their communities.

The new public-private grant program established under House Bill 211



would help expand the service, develop mobile applications and ensure efficiency and quality standards across the state, all while reducing the taxpayer costs needed to ensure its success. House Bill 211 now moves to the Senate for consideration.

Recognizing Lyme Disease Awareness Month in PA

Spring has sprung, and so has the desire to spend time in the great



outdoors. In May, we recognized Lyme Disease Awareness Month in Pennsylvania, because it is important to remember the dangers that deer ticks can carry.

Several scientific and media reports claim that due to our mild winter, we could have a bad tick season ahead, and I want to take this opportunity to share some helpful information.

Deer ticks are the primary carrier of Lyme disease, which is a zoonotic disease or transmissible between animals and humans. The Department of Environmental Protection released a study last year confirming a high risk of Lyme in every county of the Commonwealth, as deer ticks have been found in all 67 counties. We lead the nation in confirmed cases of Lyme disease. To prevent against Lyme, the Department of Health recommends using insect repellent with DEET and wearing long sleeve shirts and long pants when venturing outdoors, along with checking for and promptly and properly removing any ticks when you return, and showering shortly after exposure.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention state that some of the early signs (30 days after tick bite) include rash, fever, chills, headache, fatigue, muscle joint aches and swollen lymph nodes. Some of the late signs and symptoms (days to months after tick bite) include severe headaches and neck stiffness, facial palsy, heart palpitations, and intermittent pain in tendons.

House Bill 174 was approved by the House Health Committee in early May to help ensure patients have access to emerging diagnostic and treatment options for Lyme disease. It would require health insurers to cover treatment plans for Lyme disease or related tick borne illnesses as prescribed by a health care practitioner. The bill will go to the full House for consideration. For more information about Lyme disease in Pennsylvania, I encourage you to visit www.health.pa.gov and search for Lyme disease.

Also of note

<u>House Bill 105</u> would improve the state's telemarketing law by making registrations on the do-not-call list permanent, rather than



reregistering after five years; prohibiting the calls on legal holidays; requiring telemarketers using a robo-call system to provide an opt-out process within the first few seconds of each call; and requiring robo-calls left on a voicemail to include a toll-free call back number that would directly connect a person to an opt-out process.

These commonsense reforms would make life easier for Pennsylvanians who do not want to receive so many telemarketing solicitations or robo-calls. Registration on the list will not prevent all calls; individuals with an existing relationship with a company, along with charitable and political calls, are exempt. The bill now goes to the Senate for review.

What is the summer slide?

No, it's not at the playground or pool. Access to books is critical. Reading just 4 to 6 books over the summer has the potential to prevent a decline in reading achievement scores from the spring to the fall, so even small steps are very beneficial. (National Summer Learning Association)

The public library is an excellent free resource for families to have access to books of a wide range of interests and reading levels, as well as librarians to guide children and families in selecting great books.

When children select reading materials themselves and read for enjoyment, they receive the most gains in reading achievement, including better reading comprehension, writing style, vocabulary, spelling, and grammatical development. The longer that this free voluntary reading is practiced, the more consistent and positive the results. Therefore, summer programs, such as those offered in public libraries, that allow and encourage children to choose what they read are likely to be most successful. Children and teens tend to read more when adults in their lives encourage them to read, and also when they see those adults reading often themselves. Children that feel that reading is fun tend to read more often, so summer programs that help make reading enjoyable and social are most successful.

OTHER BOROUGH ORDINANCES for your safety and knowledge

21-1. Public Places



It shall be a summary offense to possess, use, or to facilitate the possession and consumption by another of any wine, beer, whiskey, or other alcoholic beverages in or on any public property of the Borough of Northumberland including but not limited to the public parks, pool, fields, or Borough Offices. Provided however: the Borough Council may by resolution, and consistent with

the Liquor Code and PLCB regulations, permit the sale or use of alcohol at special events on Borough Property.

40-2 Offenses involving children

- A. It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of seventeen (17) years to be in or upon the streets, walkways, roads, alleys, parks or playgrounds, public buildings, vacant lots or other unsupervised places within the Borough of Northumberland between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. of the following day; provided, however, that the provisions of this subsection do not apply to a minor accompanied by his or her parent, guardian or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor or to a minor who is upon an emergency errand or legitimate business directed by his or her parent, guardian or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor.
- B. It shall be unlawful **for the parent, guardian or other adult person having the care and custody of a minor under the age of seventeen (17) years to knowingly permit such minor** to be in or upon the public streets, walkways, roads, alleys, parks or playgrounds, public buildings, vacant lots or other unsupervised places within the Borough of Northumberland between 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. of the following day; provided, however, that the provisions of this subsection do not apply when the parent, guardian or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor is accompanying said minor or when the minor is upon an emergency errand or legitimate business directed by the parent, guardian or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor.


