I wish to thank all of the volunteers who helped with decorating our park and downtown area for the holidays.


Also, thanks to our street department and office employees who placed the decorations and Santa's House; all who helped with Santa's arrival, and thanks to Santa himself!

Penn DOT Eliminated Vehicle Registration Stickers in 2017

Beginning Jan. 1, 2017, Penn DOT no longer issues license plate stickers when drivers renew their vehicle registrations. The sticker elimination is part of a \$3 million-plus cost-saving initiative under Act 89 of 2013.

Customers are still required to maintain current vehicle registration, and must present a registration card to law enforcement when asked. A valid registration card is also still required when having a safety and/or emissions inspection completed.



NO STICKER

Many law enforcement agencies use license plate reader technology to efficiently validate registrations. A Penn State research study concluded that eliminating the registration sticker has no impact on vehicle registration compliance.



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NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY



Thursday April 20th—7 pm John Moore will present "The defiant Northumberland editor vs. President John Adams"

In 1798 the U.S. government enacted the Alien and Sedition laws, which, among other things, made it illegal to criticize the president of the United States. These laws didn't sit well with Thomas Cooper, editor of the Sunbury and Northumberland Gazette. In June 1799 he published blistering criticism of the president. One of his readers sent the article to the U.S. government. In April 1800, Cooper stood trial in Philadelphia, charged with libeling Adams. Convicted, Cooper spent six months in jail. A retired newspaper editor, Moore will provide details of the case and tell why the news media today enjoys the freedom to criticize our government.

Saturday May 13th 10-3 History Day — Don't miss this living timeline of history! Visit with reenactors from different time periods. See canal memorabilia, special displays and craftspeople. Programs on different topics of local history will be presented in the library throughout the day. Food and drinks available.

Thursday May 18th Glenda Strouse will tell "The Story of Packer's Island and the 16 Packer Farms." Since 1700, the mile-long island situated in the Susquehanna River's North Branch opposite Sunbury has experienced many changes. Today, the island has a state park, an airport and two campgrounds. There are few vestiges of its earlier incarnations. During the first half of the 18th century, it was part of the Native American town known as Shamokin, an Algoquian Indian word that meant "place of eels." Agriculture became its main-stay during the 1800s, when it became known as Packer's Island, but its agricultural heyday is all but forgotten. Local historian Glenda Strouse will remedy this in her presentation, "The Story of Packer's Island and the 16 Packer farms." A farm woman herself, Strouse has accumulated a wealth of information about this long-ago period in the island's history.

FLOOD INFORMATION

Properties in Northumberland's floodplain are subject to three flood problems:

Overbank Flooding: Flooding of both the West Branch and the North Branch of the Susquehanna River. Flooding presents a safety hazard. Velocities can be as high as 6 or 7 feet per second – so fast that the flood will wash people off their feet in only ½ foot of floodwaters.

Local Drainage: There are several areas of local drainage problems where storm water collects and does not drain away. Sometimes, flooding is aggravated by debris that has been carelessly thrown into the channel.

Sewer Backup: With no place to go, sewers back up and flow into the lowest opening in the sewer line. Northumberland has had basement flooding caused by sewer backups.

Find out if your property is in the mapped floodplain by calling the Borough at 570-473-3414 or Point Township at 570-473-3198, view the map at northumberlandborough.com

FLOODPROOFING a house means altering it so floodwaters will not cause damage. Different flood proofing techniques are appropriate for different types of buildings.

FLOOD INSURANCE is highly recommended because no flood proofing measure is 100% foolproof. Most homeowners insurance policies do not cover a property for flood damage. Additional information is available at the Borough Office or at northumberlandborough.com.

Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection. There is a 30-day waiting period before National Flood Insurance coverage takes effect. Contact your insurance agent for more information.

FLOOD PROTECTION REGULATIONS Lots were originally designed so water would flow away from the building and along property lines to the street, storm sewer, or ditch. Fences, railroad ties, landscaping and re-grading block this flow. So do construction projects in the ditches or the floodplain. ALWAYS CHECK WITH THE BOROUGH OR TOWNSHIP OFFICE BEFORE YOU BUILD ON, FILL, ALTER, OR REGRADE YOUR PROPERTY. A permit is needed to ensure that such projects do not cause problems on other properties.

SAFETY TIPS Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Don't drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out. Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.

Be alert for gas leaks. Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use a generator or other gasoline powered machine outdoors. The same goes for camping stoves. Clean everything that got wet.

ELEVATION CERTIFICATES New construction and substantial improvements to buildings on the floodplain requires a FEMA Elevation Certificate. Elevation certificates are on file at Borough Office.

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


PENNSYLVANIA'S SCHOOL BUS STOPPING LAW KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE






You **MUST STOP** at an intersection, whether it is or is not marked with a stop sign.
All traffic MUST stop.



You **MUST STOP** on roadways with painted lines.



PENNSYLVANIA'S SCHOOL BUS STOPPING LAW

- When you meet or overtake a stopped school bus with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you MUST STOP.
- When you approach an inter section where a school bus is stopped with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you MUST STOP.
- You MUST STOP at least ten (10) feet away from the school bus.
- You MUST WAIT until the red lights have stopped flashing and the stop arm has been withdrawn before moving.
- DO NOT MOVE until all the children have reached a place of safety

KNOW YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1.5 million children are transported on Pennsylvania roads each day.
- These children are transported more than 400 million miles to school each year.
- Every year, children are needlessly injured or killed by drivers passing stopped school buses.

PENALTIES

If you are convicted of violating Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law, you will receive **all** of the following penalties:

- 60-Day Driver's License Suspension
- Five (5) points on your driving record
- \$250 Fine

Annually, over 1,000 motorists do not obey the School Bus Stopping Law.

The Borough will again be hiring college students and college-bound high school seniors as part of the Summer Intern Program. A student must receive a P.H.E.A.A. grant to be eligible.


Traditionally, the borough has employed students to work at Liberty Splashland, Pineknotter Park and with the Borough Street Department.


Students working at Pineknotter Park maintain the ball field and operate the concession stand.


Students working with the Borough Street




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PRIESTLEY-FORSYTHE MEMORIAL LIBRARY



PROPERTY TAX/RENT REBATE PROGRAM

Applications for the state's 2016 Property Tax/Rent Rebate program are now available in both of my district offices. The forms can also be accessed through the Department of Revenue's website, www.revenue.pa.gov. There is a direct link on my website, www.LyndaCulver.com. Applications are due by June 30.

The annual income limit is \$35,000 for homeowners and \$15,000 for renters, and half of Social Security income is excluded. Eligible participants can receive a rebate of up to \$650 based on their rent or property taxes paid in 2016. Eligibility income limits are set at the following levels, excluding 50 percent of Social Security, Supplemental Security Income and Railroad Retirement Tier 1 benefits:

- \$0 to \$8,000, maximum \$650 rebate (homeowners and renters).
- \$8,001 to \$15,000, maximum \$500 rebate (homeowners and renters).
- \$15,001 to \$18,000, maximum \$300 rebate (homeowners only).
- \$18,001 to \$35,000, maximum \$250 rebate (homeowners only).

As a reminder, residents of the 108th District do not need to pay a private entity for assistance. We have a retired professional who has volunteered to help our office with Property Tax/Rent Rebate applications during the tax season. She will be in our district office, located at 106 Arch St., in Sunbury, on Tuesdays and Thursdays. If you're unable to come on one of those days, my staff is available to assist residents during any other weekday. Please bring all necessary income, property tax or rental information that is required to complete the form. If you submitted forms for the 2015 program year, you may already have received booklets in the mail.




