

JOIN US FOR A 17857 COMMUNITY MEETING OCTOBER 25TH AT 7:00 PM 2ND ST COMMUNITY CENTER

Earlier this fall a Community Bicycle and Pedestrian Audit (CBPA) process was started. Unfortunately, very few people provided input at the first meeting. The CBPA is intended to raise awareness about the importance of bicycle and pedestrian friendly community design for encouraging healthy and active lifestyles.

The process and related meetings and activities are also intended to encourage the community and its leaders to consider general and



The audit process is almost complete, this meeting will provide an opportunity to hear the findings and provide additional input prior to the final report.

The CBPA will be facilitated by a consultant and staff of the Susquehanna Greenway Partnership in collaboration with Metropolitan Planning Organization and County Planning Department staff and a diverse local stakeholder group. It is funded by a PADCNR Peer Grant, with matching funds from Norry & Point.

THE PARADE IS BACK IN TOWN

The Norry Halloween Parade is back on schedule for October 24th. Due to the construction, the parade route will be slightly shorter than in past years. The detour route for State Route 147 for both north & south bound traffic will be Hanover and 7th Streets.

The parade will originate at King Street Park, proceed up 2nd Street to Orange, up Orange to 6th, where the judges stand will be, down 6th to Queen, proceed down Queen to Front, and along Front back to King Street Park. The parade will begin to form at 6:00 pm and move at 7:00 pm.

The bridges between Norry, Sunbury once charged tolls.

When bridges were first built across the Susquehanna River linking Northumberland and Sunbury, travelers had to pay a toll. That was 204 years ago.

The bridges were privately owned, and the managers of the Northumberland Bridge Co. adopted a fee schedule on September 10, 1814. The bridges were brand new. Before then, travelers either had to ford the river or wait for the ferry.

If farmers or merchants wanted to drive a wagon pulled by a six-horse team across the bridges, they had to pay \$1.25. In turn, people crossing in "four-wheeled vehicles of pleasure drawn by four horses" had to pay the same toll.

It was cheaper to travel in wagons, carriages and buggies with two wheels. The driver of a two-wheel vehicle drawn by two horses had to pay 50 cents, but a two-wheel vehicle pulled by one horse cost only a quarter.

Here are other fares imposed by the bridge company:

- A chair or other two-wheeled vehicle of pleasure, 25¢ for each horse;
- A four-horse sleigh, 50 cents;
- A one-horse sleigh, or horse and rider, 183/4 cents;
- A horse without a rider, 121/2 cents;
- Foot passengers and horned cattle, 61/4 cents for each individual; &
- Sheep or swine, 2 cents.

JOSEPH PRIESTLEY HOUSE

Heritage Day Open House and free admission at the Rev. Dr. Joseph Priestley's Sunday, Nov. 4 from 1:00 -4:00 pm. for self-guided tours of the 18th century home of the renowned scientist, clergyman and education innovator. Costumed guides will staff the Federal-Georgian style interior, providing information about life in Northumberland between 1794 and 1804, when Priestley pursued his scientific and religious interests here.

Ronald Blatchley of New Berlin, a retired chemistry teacher, will re-enact Priestley's early scientific demonstrations at 1:30 and 2:30 pm. Due to



limited seating in the Pond Building tickets are required for admission. Tickets can be obtained at the Visitor Center or reserved beforehand. In addition to the lab demonstrations there will be children's games in several rooms of the mansion.

The annual fall event is sponsored by Friends of Joseph Priestley House. The house is owned by

the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and administered by Pennsylvania Historic and Museum Commission. The Friends group, under an agreement with the PHMC, provides volunteer staff to keep the museum open to the public on weekends from March through November.

WATER POLLUTION - EVERYONE'S PROBLEM

Each of the drains in the Borough's stormwater system eventually outfalls into the Susquehanna River. The system has hundreds of drains, and miles of connecting pipes. The intent of the system is to carry rainwater, and only rainwater, away from buildings and off the street.

While designed for rainwater, everything and anything in the street is likely to enter the system and end in the Susquehanna including liter, grass clippings, detergents and pet waste.

The Borough is responsible for maintaining the system in good working order. We need your help ensuring that only rainwater enters the system.

Why you should help, and why it is everyone' problem?

While it may seem that the little bit of liter, grass clippings, detergents and pet waste seen going down a drain is not much, it accumulates. If you would add it all up, there would be far more than you think. Pollutants impact not only aquatic habitats, but the next downstream community that pulls its drinking water from the Susquehanna.

Lawn and garden fertilizers, grass clippings and pet waste are sources of nitrogen and phosphorous. Excess quantities of these necessary nutrients cause algae growth to explode which harms water quality, aquatic habitats and lowers oxygen levels.

Litter - plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles, and cigarette butts - washed into waterbodies can choke, suffocate, or disable aquatic life like ducks, fish, turtles, and birds.

Insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil and other auto fluids can poison aquatic life. Land animals, including the human variety, can become sick or die from eating diseased fish and shellfish or ingesting polluted water.

What can you do?

Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly, Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible. Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street, or sweep it into drains.

Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground. Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.

Pet waste is a major problem; remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it in a garbage container. Pet waste does not decompose the same has human waste, so it is not recommended to flush it.

Collect rainwater from rooftops in mosquito-proof containers. The water can be used later on lawn or garden areas.

Clean up spills and leaks of fuel, oil and other harmful fluids immediately. Cat litter often works well, and can be readily disposed of in a garbage container.

On litter, first just don't, especially cigarette butts. Second, when you're out and about, be kind and pick up any litter you may find. And third, thank you to all who already do!

Please put leaves between the curb and the sidewalk as this allows for a quicker pick up, and avoid putting leaf piles around trees, posts, etc. Avoid small branches as this jams the leaf mulcher. Do not put on street! Leaves behind cars will not be picked up. Please remove cars according to "No Parking" schedule.

Point Township will start to pick up leaves as soon as the majority of the leaves fall.

PA Treasury Holding Military Decorations

The Pennsylvania Treasury announced the launch of a new state website dedicated to reuniting military decorations that have been reported as unclaimed property with their rightful owners. The new search function allows users to search their names, or the name of a



loved one, to see if Treasury is holding a military decoration as unclaimed property. Military decorations are often reported to Treasury as contents held in a safe deposit box that has gone unclaimed or abandoned.

Since 2017, Treasury has returned 58 service decorations, some of which have been in Treasury's custody for decades, including Purple Hearts, to their rightful owners. Treasury continues to search for the owners of over 500 unclaimed military awards. To check for your family go to: https://www.patreasury.gov/unclaimed-property/medals/

Important new credit Law

A new federal law went into effect on Friday 9/21/2018 that allows consumers to freeze their credit without any fees. A credit freeze restricts access to your credit file, essentially halting anyone from opening any new credit in your name. Congress passed the law in response to last year's massive Equifax hack, which exposed the private information of more than 145 million Americans.

The law requires that credit freezes be free for consumers across the country. Lifting the freeze is also free and must be done within the hour, if the request was made by phone or online; 3-days if by mail.

Consumers who want to freeze their credit should visit the websites of all three credit reporting agencies — Equifax, Experian and TransUnion — to make their request at each. The FTC also will have links to those pages on its identity theft information website: www.identitytheft.gov.

Additionally, the law allows for a free credit freeze for children under age 16, something that was not previously allowed in all states. This helps prevent criminals from creating fraudulent accounts under a child's identity, a problem that often goes undetected until they are adults and seek credit of their own.

Are You Prepared?

With all the natural disasters which seem to be occurring lately, state



and national officials remind residents that September was National Preparedness month, an opportunity to prepare ourselves and our families now and throughout the year.

As part of the awareness month, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is

urging residents to make and practice a preparedness plan, learn life -saving skills, check your insurance coverage and save for an emergency. Residents should adapt their plans for all types of emergencies and disasters – residential fires, tornadoes, hurricanes, flooding, snowstorms, earthquakes, natural gas leaks and other events involving evacuations.

FLOOD INFORMATION

Properties in our floodplain are subject to three flood problems:

Overbank Flooding: Flooding of both the West Branch and the North Branch of the Susquehanna River. Flooding presents a safety hazard. Velocities can be as high as 6 or 7 feet per second – so fast that the flood will wash people off their feet in only $\frac{1}{2}$ foot of floodwaters.

Local Drainage: There are several areas of local drainage problems where storm water collects and does not drain away. Sometimes, flooding is aggravated by debris that has been carelessly thrown into the channel.

Sewer Backup: With no place to go, sewers back up and flow into the lowest opening in the sewer line. Northumberland has had basement flooding caused by sewer backups.

Find out if your property is in the mapped floodplain by calling the Borough at 570-473-3414 or Point Township at 570-473-3198, view the map at northumberlandborough.com

FLOOD PROOFING a house means altering it so floodwaters will not cause damage. Different flood proofing techniques are appropriate for different types of buildings.

FLOOD INSURANCE is highly recommended because no flood proofing measure is 100% foolproof. Most homeowners insurance policies do not cover a property for flood damage. Additional information is available at the Borough Office or at northumberlandborough.com.

Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection. There is a 30-day waiting period before National Flood Insurance coverage takes effect. Contact your insurance agent for more information.

FLOOD PROTECTION REGULATIONS Lots were originally designed so water would flow away from the building and along property lines to the street, storm sewer, or ditch. Fences, railroad ties, landscaping and re-grading block this flow. So do construction projects in the ditches or the floodplain. ALWAYS CHECK WITH THE BOROUGH OR TOWNSHIP OFFICE BEFORE YOU BUILD ON, FILL, ALTER, OR REGRADE YOUR PROPERTY. A permit is needed to ensure that such projects do not cause problems on other properties.

SAFETY TIPS Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Don't drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out. Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.

Be alert for gas leaks. Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use a generator or other gasoline powered machine outdoors. The same goes for camping stoves. Clean everything that got wet.

ELEVATION CERTIFICATES New construction and substantial improvements to buildings on the floodplain requires a FEMA Elevation Certificate. Elevation certificates are on file at Borough Office.

"Ready Rosie" is an online early education tool that helps families, schools, and communities across the nation deepen and scale their family engagement efforts. Ready Rosie tools leverage the power of video modeling, family workshops, professional development opportunities and mobile technology to build powerful partnerships between families and educators, resulting in READY FAMILIES.

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DOLL DAY AT PRIESTLEY HOUSE BROUGHT OUT THE DOLLS, AND PLENTY OF DOLL LOVERS

If you visited Joseph Priestley House on June 9, you probably counted as many dolls as people, maybe more. At least 40 children and 60



adults participated in the activities the Friends of the Joseph Priestley House sponsored at the World Doll Day Celebration.

As the event's name suggested, the World Doll Day Celebration celebrated everything dolls, including portions of the Joseph Priestley House. The entrance hall and the library were open to all visitors during the event, and docents were on hand at the Visitor's Center to take guests on paid tours through the entire house. Merry Mary greeted visitors to the house in the entrance

hall, dubbed Tribute Hall for the day. Merry Mary was a regular at Priestley House, where she, along with her creator Ruth Eleanor McCorkill, greeted children and visitors at special Priestley House Events. Annie Priestley's dolls, usually housed on the third floor of the Priestley-Forsyth Library, were on display on the mantelpiece in her great grandfather's library. Those who toured the house, could see a porcelain doll, used to model the newest dress styles coming out of England in the 1700s, on display in the upstairs bedroom.

The Pond Building housed a variety of doll collections made available for the day by members of the Penn Ferry Doll Club, as well as local doll enthusiasts. Treva Smith and Fiona Powell offered doll related history lectures. Treva lectured on the Hitty dolls and the Mary Hoyer Doll. The original Hitty, an antique store find in 1929, is a small wooden doll, about 6 and ½ inches tall. Hitty became the inspiration for the Rachel Field and Dorothy Lathrop Newberry Medal winning book *Hitty – Her First Hundred Years*. The Mary Hoyer Doll made its start in a yarn shop in Reading, Pennsylvania, originally intended as a model for infant and children's clothes designed by Mary Hoyer. Eventually Mary Hoyer worked with Bernard Lipfert, a well-known doll sculptor, to create her own doll. Fiona entertained her audiences with information related to Civil War Handkerchief Dolls and Welsh Pisgies (Pixies). American Girl Dolls and Madame Alexander dolls also found their place among the collection displays.

The highlight of the day was the Merry Mary Tea held on the patio behind the Visitor's Center. Pre-registered guests were able to enjoy a Victorian Tea. Dolls and fancy dresses were welcome; children participating in the tea were also able to take home a china teacup and a crown. The adults seemed equally excited by the Victorian Tea, so the final setting of the afternoon was an Adults Only event.

The day also included storytelling under the big tent; food concessions, including root beer floats in honor of Priestley's discovery of carbonation; doll related merchandise; and painted cutouts for special photo ops.

Inspired by Ruth Eleanor McCorkill's love of dolls, Joseph Priestley House and the brainchild of Hope W. Kopf, the World Doll Day Celebration brought these seemingly diverse interests together. "An avid doll collector in her own right, Ruth Eleanor would have loved to see us combine dolls and Priestley House," said Hope.
