NORTHUMBERLAND-POINT TOWNSHIP HALLOWEEN PARADE

Over fifty years ago, the first Northumberland-Point Township Halloween Parade took place with about 10 entries and a march down 4th Street. The parade has since grown to be a little bigger... hopefully even bigger this year!

On Wednesday, October 30th, the Halloween Parade will be held forming at King Street Park beginning at 6 pm. The parade will start moving at 7 pm. The route will begin at King Street Park, up 2nd Street, to Orange Street, down Orange to 6th Street, down 6th Street to Queen Street, down Queen street to Front Street, up Front Street, and ending back at the Park. Front Street at the end of the Park will be accessible to pick up/drop off parade traffic only.

Your volunteer work might also expose you to professional organizations or internships that could be of benefit to your career.



A school bus is stopped at a 4-way intersection. How do you proceed?



You must stop for stopped school buses with flashing red lights and an extended stop sign when you approach from ANY direction.

Can I make a turn away from the bus?

No, remain stopped until all persons are clear and the bus moves again.

If you are convicted of failing to stop for a school bus with RED LIGHTS FLASHING & STOP ARM EXTENDED, you will receive ALL of the following penalties:
Fine of \$250
5 Points attached to license
License suspension for 60 days

Annually, more than 700 PA drivers are convicted for passing a stopped school bus with its red lights flashing.



LEAF PICK-UP

Northumberland Borough Street Department will begin leaf pickup as soon as 80% of the leaves have fallen. Pickup will follow the posted "No Parking" schedule on the streets. Final pickup will be December 2nd, 3rd & 4th.



Please do not place leaves in bags or in the streets. Leaves should be piled in the space between the sidewalk and curbs.

Point Township will start to pick up leaves as soon as the majority of the leaves fall.

BRUSH COLLECTION SERVICE

Borough of Northumberland

Guidelines effective as of September 2019

As a courtesy to residents ONLY within the Borough Limits of Northumberland, the Borough Street Department provides brush collection service.

Brush will be picked up the **2nd Wednesday of each month** from April through November and after severe storms.

Please follow the guidelines below. Failure to comply will result in your brush NOT being accepted for pickup. Please call the Borough Office at 570-473-3414 with any questions.

For Routine Monthly Brush Pickup - Brush MUST:

- 1. Be placed curbside no sooner than the weekend before, or later than 7:00 AM on the pickup day (Wednesday).
- 2. Be less than 4 feet long, no larger than 4 inches diameter; stacked neatly with butts all on one end.
- 3. Originate from resident's property ONLY.
- 4. Weeds, sticks, twigs, and leaves may be placed in an orderly pile or in an unlined can.

Brush must NOT:

- 1. Be bagged. It will NOT be picked-up if it is in plastic bags.
- 2. Include, stumps, vines, grass clippings, sod, roots or root balls.
- 3. Be located where it restricts drainage such as in a gutter line or covering an inlet grate.
- 4. Be located where it impedes vehicular and or walking traffic in the street or sidewalk.
- 5. Include trash, nails, building materials, dirt or rocks.
- 6. 6Be tied with string, twine, wire or any other material.
- 7. Be left by a commercial tree removal or trimming company. If cut by one of these companies, it should remove it as part of their contract with the resident.

***GRASS CLIPPINGS:** Experts in lawn care recommend that clippings be left on the lawn to absorb back into the soil or composted with other natural yard waste. They will **NOT** pick up any grass clippings.

The amount of time spent at any one residence should not exceed 2 minutes. In that amount of time, the street department should be able to empty several cans or pick up a bundle of limbs.



Committee Highlights Tick-Borne Diseases, Tick Testing

Working to address the ongoing threat of Lyme and other tick-borne diseases in the Commonwealth, the House Health Committee held a public hearing in East Stroudsburg Monday.

The committee heard from health and wildlife professionals, local officials, advocates for tick-borne disease treatment and awareness, and officials with East Stroudsburg University's (ESU) Tick Research Lab.

Testimony focused heavily on the importance of early diagnosis and treatment in helping people successfully recover from Lyme and other tickborne diseases. Three bills designed to help combat the disease were also highlighted, including one that would require nurses to remove a tick when it is found on a child during the school day and to notify parents; one that



would require continuing education for physicians; and one to require health insurers to cover recommended treatments that may include short-term or long-term courses of antibiotics.



Members participating in the hearing also learned more about ESU's tick lab,

which provides a FREE base test on ticks submitted for Lyme disease as well as three additional tests based on the species of tick. Pennsylvanians can send a tick sample to the lab and receive the test results. These samples can be mailed to 562 Independence Road, East Stroudsburg, PA 18301.

Online Absentee Ballot Applications Launched Monday Sept 16th

Starting with this year's General Election, voters who need to vote by absentee ballot may apply for the ballot online. The mobile-friendly, online application site, available at <u>votesPA.com/ApplyAbsentee</u>, will go live on Monday, Sept. 16, the first day that registered voters may apply for absentee ballots for the Nov. 5 election

When an applicant completes the online form, the information is forwarded directly to the appropriate county elections office for processing. The applicant will then be provided with a ballot that must be completed and either mailed or hand-delivered to the appropriate county election office by the deadline, which is 5 p.m. on the Friday before the election, or Nov. 1 this year.

The online application system will be accessible for all domestic Pennsylvania voters this year and to military and overseas voters by 2020.

Absentee ballots may be cast by individuals with illnesses or disabilities, individuals who will be away from their municipality on business on Election Day, and Pennsylvania students attending out-of-state colleges or universities, among others.

FLOOD INFORMATION

Properties in our floodplain are subject to three flood problems:

Overbank Flooding: Flooding of both the West Branch and the North Branch of the Susquehanna River. Flooding presents a safety hazard. Velocities can be as high as 6 or 7 feet per second – so fast that the flood will wash people off their feet in only $\frac{1}{2}$ foot of floodwaters.

Local Drainage: There are several areas of local drainage problems where storm water collects and does not drain away. Sometimes, flooding is aggravated by debris that has been carelessly thrown into the channel.

Sewer Backup: With no place to go, sewers back up and flow into the lowest opening in the sewer line. Northumberland has had basement flooding caused by sewer backups.

Find out if your property is in the mapped floodplain by calling the Borough at 570-473-3414 or Point Township at 570-473-3198, view the map at northumberlandborough.com

FLOOD PROOFING a house means altering it so floodwaters will not cause damage. Different flood proofing techniques are appropriate for different types of buildings.

FLOOD INSURANCE is highly recommended because no flood proofing measure is 100% foolproof. Most homeowners insurance policies do not cover a property for flood damage. Additional information is available at the Borough Office or at northumberlandborough.com.

Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection. There is a 30-day waiting period before National Flood Insurance coverage takes effect. Contact your insurance agent for more information.

FLOOD PROTECTION REGULATIONS Lots were originally designed so water would flow away from the building and along property lines to the street, storm sewer, or ditch. Fences, railroad ties, landscaping and re-grading block this flow. So do construction projects in the ditches or the floodplain. ALWAYS CHECK WITH THE BOROUGH OR TOWNSHIP OFFICE BEFORE YOU BUILD ON, FILL, ALTER, OR REGRADE YOUR PROPERTY. A permit is needed to ensure that such projects do not cause problems on other properties.

SAFETY TIPS Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Don't drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out. Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.

Be alert for gas leaks. Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use a generator or other gasoline powered machine outdoors. The same goes for camping stoves. Clean everything that got wet.

ELEVATION CERTIFICATES New construction and substantial improvements to buildings on the floodplain requires a FEMA Elevation Certificate. Elevation certificates are on file at Borough Office.

"Kids Rock", Mondays 4-5 pm for Kindergarten and first graders, helping them to become more confident/independent readers by reading books that match their skill levels.




