### Thirty Years Later, Still Going Strong!

It's been a little more than 30 years since a group of communityminded individuals got together to plan a celebration for the Northumberland - Point Township Bi-centennial. They surely did not envision the annual weeklong celebration known Pineknotter as Days into which their endeavor would evolve. It was only after the Bicentennial, as they reflected on the great community spirit and fellowship that took place during the festivities, did they decide to

make it an annual event. To that end, The Northumberland – Point Township Pineknotter Days Association was incorporated September 4, 1973.

Although the Pineknotter Days Committee spends the better part of a year planning for the next year's celebration, the success of Pineknotter Days is possible only through the cooperation of many other people. Each year, businesses and non-profit groups bring their wares into the park; some of these vendors have been a part of Pineknotter Days since its inception in 1973. For some nonprofit groups, this is the main source of income.

However, no matter how many or what concessions are involved, without the support of general public, the Pineknotter Days could not continue to be as successful as it has been. Each year, Northumberland - Point Township area residents, as well as those from surrounding communities, come and

## The Health Report: Food borne Illness

By Lee Shaffer, Borough Health Officer

In a recent survey by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) with regard to Food borne Illness, the following risk factors are the greatest need of attention. I would point out that the factors are equally important in the home as well as in the food industry.

These include the following:

• Improper Holding Times and Temperatures i.e.: cold foods below 41°F – hot foods 140°F or above

• Contaminated Equipment/Cross Contamination

Wash fruit and vegetables before cutting.

Do not cut raw meat and then cut fruits and vegetables using the same knife.

•Poor Personal Hygiene

Wash hands before handling food; Use hair restraints, etc.

#### Food Safety Guidelines for Bake Sales

While we do not usually associate food borne outbreaks with these types of sales, baked goods still require food handlers to practice safe food handling methods. Here are some tips for people providing and selling at bake sales.

All food should be prepared in clean and sanitary kitchens by persons free of communicable diseases.

All food handlers must wash their hands with soap and warm water before preparing food.

Food should be tightly wrapped or sealed during transport. Vehicles used to transport food should be clean. Food should not be transported with family pets. Packages must not be open and cannot be opened to sell part of the contents.

Any decorating of cookies, cakes, etc., must be done prior to packaging and cannot be finished in the booth.

All food contact sur-

faces must be clean and sanitized regularly. Use disposable paper towels for cleaning. Avoid using sponges; they harbor bacteria. A sanitizing solution can be made using one (1) teaspoon of chlorine bleach with one (1) quart of lukewarm water. This may be placed into a spray bottle and labeled "sanitizer" for easy use. Sanitizing solution should be made fresh daily since the bleach can dissipate. (See The Health Report on

Food handlers should not use bare hands to handle food. If hands are used, they must be washed, dried and covered with gloves before contacting ready-to-eat foods. Or, food handlers can use utensils such as tongs to serve food.

If offering food samples, protect them with a cover and offer them to customers with clean tongs, toothpicks, napkins, etc.


A trash container must be provided for disposal of spoons, toothpicks, napkins, etc.

Items acceptable for a bake sale are breads – yeast, quick breads; cakes (except creamfilled or cheesecake); cookies; brownies; muffins; candies; dried fruits, herbs, spices; cupcakes (except creamfilled); and fruit pies NOT requiring refrigeration. Items NOT acceptable for a bake sale are cheesecake; pumpkin, cream or custard pies;

cream-filled cupcakes or doughnuts; frostings and fillings with cream cheese or whipped cream; homemade ice cream; and frozen items.

meat, poultry and seafood must come from an approved source. Food processing plants, meat processors, poultry and seafood should be prepared in Department of Agriculture approved facilities.

If they are not approved we do not know if it is a sanitary facility, how the meat is chilled or stored and transported. Our local shops and markets are inspected and approved by us and we try to make sure their suppliers are all approved. Health Issues within the borough can be addressed by calling Lee at 473-3414.


West Nile Virus Warning

WEST NILE virus is a serious concern and we are asking for your help in order to prevent it from spreading. More birds, especially crows, have tested positive for the virus in Pennsylvania. In addition to birds, mosquitoes are also known carriers of this virus. The WEST NILE virus is a known cause of meningitis and potentially death. Our concern and obligation is to eliminate the breeding sites for mosquitoes. This includes items such as tires, cans, pans, unused wading/ kiddy pools, sandboxes, clogged rain gutters, unused swimming pools, small bodies of water in low lying ground, and anywhere else that stagnant water can accumulate.


