

The Joseph Priestley
House is the most famous
historical dwelling in the
Borough and is at the beginning of this selfguided walking tour.
This brochure includes
facts about the Priestley
home as well as more
than 40 other structures in
the Borough.

Effective Recycling Requires Controlled Burning

DEP regulations require municipalities with recycling programs to establish guidelines concerning open burning. No materials collected for recycling may be burned because it wastes a product which has a defined new use and burning the material reduces the amount the municipality receives to recycle. Burning recyclable materials lowers the income for the municipality. Presently, Liberty Glass Center accepts the following materials for recycling: Corrugated cardboard, steel and aluminum cans, newsprint, magazines, office paper and glass bottles (clear, green and brown). Cans

and bottles need to be rinsed out. The only material you may burn in the Borough of Northumberland is dry paper. Burning plastics, diapers and pet feces is absolutely prohibited. Burning prohibited materials may be hazardous to the health of the person burning as well as their neighbors due to the vapors produced in the burning process. Additionally, odors produced while burning prohibited materials is highly disrespectful of your neighbors. Burning in the Borough of Northumberland is allowed only on Wednesdays from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Saturdays

from 7:00 a.m. to 11:00 **a.m.** For the protection of you and your neighbors, receptacles for burning must be located at least fifteen (15) feet from any building. The burning receptacle must be covered by a wire mesh with holes no larger than one (1) inch square and the fire needs to supervised by a person at least sixteen (16) years of age. Smoldering and smoking fires are prohibited. These facts are contained in the Northumberland Property Maintenance Code 42-12. Give a Hoot, Don't Pollute – recycling makes sense for the future of us all.

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Summer, the Outdoors, Picnics and Pineknotters...

The things we have been looking forward to all winter. To enjoy all the summer activities, we need to exercise care and caution.

The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, PA Dept. of Agriculture, and your local Health Department work very hard to ensure that the food you get is safe and free of contamination. With the recently enacted and upgraded food codes, we are attempting to have trained and certified food handlers where food is served to the public. We are offering a modified food training program for volunteers churches, etc. This is an attempt to have trained people in all areas where food is prepared and served to the public. To us it is scary to hear someone say, "We have done things this way for years and nothing has happened." In essence

this can be an accident waiting to happen. How often have you heard, "I must have had a 24-hour flu" when, in fact, it was a food-related illness? The people who are in greatest danger are the elderly, the very young, and the people who have a compromised immune system.

Things to observe and avoid:

- When you see food being improperly handled, refuse the food and report the problem.
- It is now a food code violation to handle ready-to-eat food with bare hands.
- Avoid improperly cooked food or improperly displayed foods. Hot foods hot (140° F or above). Cold foods cold (40° F or below).
- All displayed food must be protected by covers or wraps.

Food handlers should not be eating, drinking, or smoking while handling food for public consumption.

Food Safety and Security: What Consumers Need to Know, a new guide offered by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), uses the expertise of the USDA Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) to describe how the nation's supply of meat, poultry, and egg products can be protected against intentional and unintentional contamination.
