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## Third Annual History Day Set

The Northumberland/ Point Township Revitalization Committee and its History Day Committee have a wonderful History Day planned this year on May 14th from 10 am to 3 pm. There will be 3 sites to explore.

In King Street Park the activities will include the following displays and demonstrations: tinsmith, blacksmith. spinning wheel and carding, potter, local faming history, Furman Foods, Pt. Township Garden Club, Postcards, Story teller, Fire Co. No. 1, and the Friends of Joseph Priestley will be available to hand out information. The Priestley -Forsyth Library will have train movies and a history quiz. They will also have Northumberland miniatures to sell. A Federal style home at 170 King Street will be open for tours. If you are hungry you can enjoy the homemade ice cream at a '50's ice cream parlor display or the homemade soup with a bison sandwich. Stop by the Victorian tea party and the bake sale while you listen to the strolling musicians. The children will enjoy the free stage coach rides. The C.W. Rice History Club will provide colonial games and a portrait board while Junior Girl Scout Troop #2548 will provide a demonstration of old-time folk games. These will be available free for children to take home. Stop by the Revitalization Committee's stand where you can purchase pottery, matchbox tins, pinecones, mugs, and other memorabilia or a print of the Front Street Train Station by Jeff Lynch.

You can take the shuttle bus to tour special historical places throughout the town including the "Pat Lyon" at the No. 1 Fire Co. (the oldest existing fire apparatus in the United States) and on to the second site at the Riverview Cemetery where our past soldiers will be honored.

The shuttle will then take you out Rt. 11 to the Lodge Run Mill House. There you can view displays of Native Americans and presentations by both the Pennsylvania Fort Augusta Regiment and the Pennsylvania Canal History Society with a canal boat display by the Muncy Historical Society and a presentation of local canal history by Captain Mick. At the Lodge Run House you will want to purchase some of the food at the open-hearth food demonstration and visit the tavern for an historical tour.

Mark your calendars now so you won't miss the fun. In case of inclement weather, the park activities will be moved inside the Second Street School gym. If you would like to volunteer or contribute in any way to this event please call the borough office at 473-3414.



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## Free Robotics Classes Being Offered

Northumberland Christian School is offering a free robotics course this summer for borough residents who will be in 7<sup>th</sup> or 8<sup>th</sup> grade next year. The course will be held at NCS, located on Second and Oueen Streets, the week of June 20th to 24th from 10:00 - 11:30 AM. The course is designed to get students interested in technology by exposing them to the fun of Robotics and uses the Lego Mindstorms, and will be taught by the school's Director of Information Systems, Jonathan Rees, who holds a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering and a master's degree in computer engineering.

The Mindstorms were born out of research from MIT and have been



used for education all the way through the college level. NCS utilizes them for some projects in its high school programming classes because of their ability to be programmed in a language similar to C. However, Lego has graphical-based software that allows students with no programming experience to be able to design and build robots as well. While students who have used the Mindstorms may attend, the course will be geared to those who have no experience.

#### **Health Officer's Report**

Help stop the spread of the West Nile Virus! This can be done by eliminating all mosquito-breeding places. Do not let stagnant water sit in unused pools, tires, cans, rain gutters, or yard ponds.

Remember to WASH YOUR HANDS! When handling food. Proper hand washing should last 20 seconds – sing Happy Birthday! Use hot water and soap, rinse and use a disposable paper towel.

Businesses are required to train certified food handlers on their staff. Now non-profits can benefit from a modified (free) food handler course. Call the Borough Office at 473-3414 if your non-profit group is interested and I will arrange for another class. One classic violation is food handlers handling ready-to-eat food with their bare hands.

A reminder for summer picnics: Keep hot foods hot, above 135°, and cold foods cold, below 41°. Foods sitting out for more than 2 hours should be discarded.

## SHIKELLAMY LITTLE LEAGUE GEARING UP FOR NEW YEAR

The local Little League Volunteers have spent countless hours during the off-season preparing for this season's upcoming events.

Currently the League consists of 113 T-Ball players, up from last year's 87; 46 minor players, up from last year's 36; 46 major players, up from last year's 44; 50 Jr. League players, up from last year's 49; 30 Sr. League players, down from last

year's 39; 26 Minor/ Major Softball players, up from last year's 25; and 14 Jr./Sr. Softball players, down from last year's 25. Overall increased participation in the program over the past four years of encompassing the local school district is up 22.31%, a great trend towards the future preservation of this community's local little league program.

Games are planned to

begin on April 25, 2005, contingent upon field and concession stand readiness, due to the recent high water that flooded the Northumberland Acorn Park and concession stand.

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## From the Northumberland Fire Chief

You may have heard or read about the Borough forming an emergency services task force. This organization was assembled at the request of the two fire companies and the council, citing problems with the fireboard and the department as a whole. The emergency services task force is comprised of a representative and alternate from both the fire companies, a representative from the council and 4 citizensat-large who have no association to either fire company. I also participate in a resource capacity only. It's important to note that the majority of the voting body of the task force is made up of residents, the fire department's "customers".

This group receives some guidance from the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED). The DCED has assisted many task forces throughout the Commonwealth with mergers, consolidations, and improvements to various VOLUNTEER fire departments' abilities to serve their customers.

The task force has had several successful meetings and is looking at how the two fire companies currently provide service to the borough and how improvements can be made. Key concerns and issues are recruitment & retention, funding, equipment purchasing, long range planning, and reorganization of the fire department's management structure. The task force will also be making decisions about dissolving the fireboard, or augmenting it in some way. No permanent decisions have been made yet.



The task force has commissioned the DCED to do a study of the fire department, which will take several months. This study will compare the Northumberland FD to best practices in fire departments serving similar communities across Pennsylvania and the U.S. This way the group has a benchmark to work from to develop

a strategy for the fire department to provide the best possible service in the most economical manner possible.


Public involvement and support is important to our process. The task force meets the last Monday of every month at 7pm in the Borough chambers. The public is invited and encouraged to attend. After all, borough residents are our Customers and every decision the emergency services task force makes will directly impact the safety of you, your family, and your neighbors.





## STREET WORK ANNOUNCED

The following streets in the Borough will be paved this year: Orange Street from Fifth Street to Front Street; Depot Street from Duke Street to the Front Street Station; Wheatley Avenue from Depot Avenue to Front Street; and Ropewalk avenue from King Street to Sheetz Avenue.

The following storm drain pipes will be replaced: Fifth Street from Prince Street to Strawbridge Road; and Third Street from Orange Street to Queen Street.

The intersection at Strawbridge Road and



Jefferson Street will be rebuilt. Three new storm drain inlet boxes and two pipes will be installed and the intersection repaved.

A new storm drain inlet box and storm drain piping and some street repair will be done at the upper end of Fifth Street, from the intersection at Elliott Drive.

The cost for the street construction work for this year is approximately \$130,000. A portion of this funding comes from the five-mill street tax, with the remaining funds coming from Liquid Fuels.

## LIBERTY RECYCLING GRANTED CHANGES

The PA DEP approved a grant request from the Borough on behalf of the volunteers who operate our Liberty Recycling Center. The request for app. \$85,000 is to replace the diesel powered Bob Cat used to move bulk amounts of recyclables and to purchase a horizontal baler to provide the opportunity to bale the newsprint collected and to bale # 1 and # 2 plastics in the future. The Borough is providing 10% of the grant amount for the purchase of this equipment.

The plan presented to DEP is to replace the Bob Cat with a propane powered fork lift equipped with a special set of forks which will allow for turning bales of recycled materials 360 degrees if necessary to store or load on a trailer for shipment.

Presently the volunteers receive no money for the newsprint recycled because the baler used will not bale newsprint. Once the new baler is in use the Liberty Recycling Center will be able to market the baled newsprint for additional income. Another

plan by the volunteers is to add # 1 and # 2 plastic bottles, jars and containers to the list of recyclables accepted.

Recycling at the *Liberty*Recycling Center is good for the community in several ways. The volunteer groups who man the center on Saturdays 7:00 am – 11:00 am and Wednesdays 5:30 pm – 8:00 pm use the money earned for projects within our community. Secondly the borough receives a yearly bonus from DEP based on the amount recycled (just over \$5000 for

2003) and reducing the volume of materials trashed saves on our individual trash bills and prolongs the life of our limited land fills which is smart for all of us. *Remember your 3 R's*, *Reduce*, *Reuse*, *and Recycle* whenever possible.

If you belong to a group who is looking for a way to earn extra cash and have people willing to work one Saturday morning and one Wednesday evening a month please stop in or give us a call and a volunteer will explain how the system works.
