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# TIME TO CLEAN UP OUR COMMUNITY

At the April 4, 2006 Borough Council Meeting, the Police Department was directed to undertake a campaign to address properties in the Borough which are in violation of the Borough's Property Maintenance Ordinance. Specifically, the Police Department was directed to focus on those properties which are in violation of the abandoned materials and structures sections of the Northumberland Borough Codes.

As such, the Police Department is going to begin in 30 days, from the

date of this newsletter, to address those properties found to be in violation of the Ordinance. To assist Borough residents, the enforcement effort will entail a systematic approach. The effort will start in the First Ward. 30 days later, violations observed on properties in the Second Ward will be addressed. Lastly, in 60 days, violations in the Third Ward will be addressed. For those property owners unfamiliar to the Borough's Wards, the First Ward is the area, running north and south, proceeding east towards

the North Branch of the Susquehanna River from Second Street. The Second Ward is the area between Second Street and Fifth Street. The Third Ward is the area from Fifth Street to the Borough line along Eighth Street.

The Police Department—with full Council backing—is encouraging all residents to comply with this Ordinance to make our community a better place to live

The applicable ordinance states:

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#### RECYCLING CENTER—NOW TAKING PLASTIC

With the arrival of this edition of the Pineknotter News you are formally invited to recycle your No. 1 and No. 2 plastic bottles and jars at the Liberty Recycling Center. We can only accept plastic bottles and jars with the recycling symbol and either num-

ber 1 PETE or number 2 HDPE imprinted on the container. Although there are plastic containers with numbers 3 thru 7 on them, the only ones with a market in this part of the country are number 1 PETE bottles and jars and number 2 HDPE containers. Toys, meat trays, cosmetic contain-

ers with a recycling symbol and either a number 1 or number 2 are NOT RECYCLABLE. Like Glass bottles and jars, please discard the caps (even if they are plastic) and rinse the containers out.

from your home.

Mercury is a hazardous substance in your home. You may have thermometers with mercury to check loved ones temperatures, a barometer to tell you when the weather is about to change or maybe you recently changed your old heating thermostat for a programmable electronic model. Each of these items may have a silver metallic material that moves in them which can be dangerous to your family's health. You can dispose of these items free of charge at the Liberty Recycling by handing it to one of the volunteers and asking them to put it in the "Mercury bucket". The recycling center has a special container from DEP to store mercury in until DEP disposes of it.

Changes abound at the Liberty Recycling Center

Thanks to a grant from DEP the Liberty Recycling Center recently took delivery of two new pieces of equipment. The grant provides a 90% refund to the borough for the new equipment. A new Toyota forklift replaces a diesel Bobcat used to move large

quantities of materials within the building and to load trucks to take the materials to sites where the recycled materials are used to make new products. A new horizontal baler has been added to the equipment line used to process the recycled materials to make them marketable. This new baler will allow us to bale newsprint to be sold to processors who will remove the ink and make new rolls of newsprint paper for daily newspapers. In the past we gave the loose newspaper away and it was then baled and sold. Magazines will also be baled to make them more marketable. We plan to continue to bale corrugated cardboard, steel cans and aluminum cans with the equipment used in the past. This new baler will also provide us with the opportunity to recycle plastic containers.

Volunteers needed

The key to the success of the Liberty Recycling Center for over 33 years is the spirit of people who have been willing to give a few hours each month to help save our landfills, reduce the cost of new materials and save our natural resources to produce new products. Individuals are not paid but the group you represent gets a yearly payout based on the money earned. Presently the recycling center is manned by volunteers representing the Lions Club, Kiwanis Club and Shikellamy Football Boosters. One more group would make it a monthly rotation. Call the borough office (473-3414) and let us know you are interested and we will show you how to help the center and your group's financial status.

Sorting Helps

Pre-sorting the materials you bring to the recycling center helps keep the quality high so we get the most money for our product and saves the volunteers a lot of work. Removing the shiny ads from newspapers helps because the shiny ads get recycled with magazines. Recycling steel cans and aluminum in separate containers is another way to help. Please do not include candle jars, drinking glasses, light bulbs or window glass with your bottles and jars.

ARTICLE II

Abandoned Materials and Structures

[Adopted 5-2-67 as Ord. No. 238; Amended 9-6-05 by Ord. No. 2005-1]

~ 42-7. Declaration of nuisance. [Amended 9-6-05 by Ord. No. 2005-1]

It is declared as a nuisance to accumulate garbage, junk and rubbish and to store abandoned or junked automobiles in the Borough of Northumberland, except on public dumping grounds; and it is directed that all dangerous structures on public or private grounds shall be prohibited in the Borough of Northumberland, Pennsylvania.

All porches, carports, sheds

and yards, open and visible to the public eye or adjacent to sidewalks utilized by the public shall remain free of discarded or broken household furnishings, dumpsters, appliances, junk, etc. and similar items, excluding the type designed for use in such structures. Such structures and areas shall be kept in a sanitary and orderly manner, free of litter, rubbish and garbage not stored in approved covered containers as required by law. All such discarded items and their containers shall be removed from such structures or areas within 24 hours.

For purposes of this Section, an abandoned or junked automobile shall be deemed to include any automobile, trailer or other titled vehicle whose state of disrepair is such that it

poses a risk of harm to children or other members of the public, or poses a risk of attracting and/or serving as shelter for snakes, vermin, insects or other wild animals.

Residents who feel their property may not be in compliance with the Ordinance and may require more than 30 days to bring their property into compliance are asked to telephone the Northumberland Borough Office, (570) 473-3414, during normal business hours, to request an extension of time prior to the deadline for their particular ward. Likewise, property owners who may not have the resources to perform a cleanup are asked to telephone the Bor- from age 5 through 5th ough Office.

# Fun with Cryptograms From The Pineknotter News

What is a cryptogram? It is simply a puzzle based on a code--one that you must break to solve the puzzle. It is a phrase or quote where each letter has had another letter substituted for it. For example, in a particular phrase, every "a" may be changed to an "x" and every "z" may be substituted by an "m." Every letter in the phrase is changed and a different code is used for each individual cryptogram.

To illustrate, look at the simple letter substitution in the following cryptogram:

- Puzzle: EZRW RW VF GSVTNCG XH V YDLNEXJDVT.
- Solution: THIS IS AN EXAMPLE OF A CRYPTOGRAM.

In this example, every "w" represents the letter "s," every "e" represents the letter "t," and so on. Letters are never substituted with themselves. You solve a cryptogram with a trial and error process, guessing the letters as you go. And as with most puzzles, practice makes perfect!

### Job Opportunity Available for this summer

Applications are available at the Northumberland Borough Office for students interested in summer employment with the Borough through the PHEAA Summer Intern Program. College students and college-bound high school seniors who receive P.H.E.A.A. loans or grants are eligible to participate in the Summer Intern Program. Interested students should contact the Borough Office at 221 Second Street, Northumberland, to obtain application forms. Employment opportunities exist at Liberty Splashland as lifeguards, concession stand and front desk clerks, and with the Borough Street Department. Students may earn up to \$2,500 during the summer months through this program. The deadline to apply is May 10, 2006.

#### **Quick Tip**

Your weight can fluctuate from day to day, and even from hour to hour. Weighing yourself every day can discourage you by giving you an inaccurate perception of your actual fitness level. Instead, weigh yourself once a week on the same day and at the same time. You'll get a better indicator of your overall weight loss, instead of monitoring the normal ups-and-downs that everyone goes through day to day.



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# What to Do When You are in an Accident

Being in a car accident can be a frightening experience. Your main concern will be your safety and the safety of all of your passengers. Once you've made certain that everyone is alright, you'll need to take these steps.

You should have your insurance information available in your vehicle and some paper and a pen to allow you to jot down the particulars of your accident and a sketch of the scene. You may also want to keep a disposable camera in your glove compartment so that you are able to accurately record the accident scene. You will need to note the name of the other driver, his or her license plate number, address, insurance information, and the names of any

responding officers to the scene. In addition, you will need the police report number to give to your insurance company.

You will need to stay at the scene until the police have come and told you it is safe for you to leave. Once you've left the scene and returned safely home, you will need to contact your insurance company. You should do this even if the accident was minor or if it was your fault. In most states, you will not necessarily have to pay higher insurance rates as a result of an accident, as some state laws protect you from this.

Your insurance agent will guide you through the claims process, but it is still a good idea to know exactly what your coverage includes. Review your copy of your insurance policy and keep copies of all documents relating to your accident. You may also want to keep a phone log of any phone calls you make to either your or the other driver's insurance company.

If you need repairs done to your car, remember that you should be in control of the repair process, even if your insurance company is footing the bill. Be comfortable with the repair shop before allowing work to start. If you feel that the job was not completed correctly, you can insist on follow-up work to correct this.

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# Mother's Day Breakfast in Bed

If you'd like to surprise your mother this Mother's Day, there is nothing nicer than a lovely breakfast in bed. These recipes will make breakfast extra special on this special day.

### Cinnamon French Toast

1 egg

2 egg whites

1/4 cup milk

1/4 teaspoon vanilla

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

8 slices thick bread

Whisk together the egg and egg whites until frothy. Stir in the milk, vanilla, and cinnamon. Heat a heavy skillet over medium heat. Dip the bread in the egg mixture, turning to coat completely. Place the coated slices in the heated skillet. Cook until browned on both sides. Sprinkle with cinnamon or powdered sugar and serve with maple syrup.

# **Ham and Egg Omelet**

2 eggs

1/4 cup diced cooked ham

1 teaspoon sliced green onions

1 tablespoon butter

1/4 cup grated cheddar cheese

In a bowl, beat the eggs. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Add in the ham and onion and mix well. Melt the butter in a 10-inch skillet over medium heat. Pour the egg mixture into the skillet. Let the eggs cook until almost set. Sprinkle the cheese over the top and, using a rubber spatula, fold the omelet in half. Remove the omelet to a plate and serve immediately.

#### **Ambrosia**

4 oranges, peeled and sliced

1 banana, peeled and sliced

1/2 cup orange juice

1/4 cup honey

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1/4 cup flaked coconut

In a bowl, combine orange and banana slices. In a separate bowl, mix together the orange juice, honey, and lemon juice. Pour over the fruit and mix well. Sprinkle the fruit mixture with the coconut before serving.

#### **Very Berry Smoothie**

1 cup vanilla or strawberry yogurt

1/2 cup milk

1/2 cup frozen strawberries

1/2 cup frozen raspberries

1/2 cup frozen blueberries

Combine all ingredients in a blender and blend until smooth. Serve immediately.

#### **Keeping Your Cool**

Protecting Yourself from the Dangers of Sunstroke

Warmer weather is just around the corner. Along with the fun of outdoor activities comes some dangers, too. Among those dangers is sunstroke, also called heat stroke. To protect you and your loved ones from this hazard, keep these tips in mind this summer

To avoid getting sunstroke, remember to drink plenty of fluids on warm days or when your activity level is up. Avoid caffeine and alcohol, both of which can dehydrate you. Wear light colored, loose clothing and always wear a hat in direct sunlight. Try to stay in the shade and take breaks as needed. If you do find that you are experiencing any symptoms of heat stroke, get help immediately. Symptoms of sunstroke include dizziness, fatigue, headache, and rapid pulse and breathing. This eventually progresses to an elevated body temperature, lack of sweating, confusion, and can lead to shock. The sooner you get treatment, the better.
