Also, you will be able to see and speak with Dave "Black Bear" Ramsey, a well known local Native American who will painstakingly depict the life and strives of his people; and view a display of local farming as Glenda Strouse shares her rich farming heritage. Listen to Rich Pawling as "Capp Hummel" (a nationally known speaker) brings history alive. His unique speaking style will truly captivate you.

Stop, relax and enjoy a Victorian Tea party, sample some delicious Victorian era treats and teas. Sit awhile in this beautifully decorated setting and enjoy the sights, smells, and sounds. And if you're hungry, you're in the right place. Stands on both sides offer delicious foods and treats. Try a smoked/slow cooked beef brisket sandwich. Or how about a bowl of hot vegetable soup, served from a kettle kept piping hot over an open wood fire? And on the other side you can get dessert. At the other end of the park you will be able to take an open carriage ride through sections of this beautiful Borough and appreciate the beauty of Spring. Stop along the way, talk with and watch a local Blacksmith forge his wares. View a restored canal boat dis-

Stop by and listen to storyteller John Moore, or view a military display presented by local author Tim Aumiller. See and speak with the Fort Augusta Regiment at their encampment. Meet and listen to well known local historian Mr. John Deppen portray Civil War General Winfield Scott Hancock.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

Food and Drug Administration (FDA) update on peanut butter recall:

As a follow-up to the recent salmonella outbreak linked to peanut butter, the FDA is informing consumers that ConAgra has extended their recall and advise consumers not to eat any Peter Pan peanut butter or any Great Value peanut butter beginning with product code 2111, including peanut butter topping, back to October 2004. All items purchased since then should be discarded.

Fresh Cut Fruits & Vegetables:

The FDA has made available a "Guide to Minimize Microbial Food Safety Hazards of Fresh-Cut Fruits and Vegetables." The purpose of the guide is to minimize the potential for microbial contamination by providing recommendations to freshcut processors. Fresh-cut produce is minimally processed and altered in form by peeling, slicing, chopping, shredding, coring or trimming. The fresh-cut produce sector is the fastest growing sector of the produce industry. From 1996 to 2006, 26% of all outbreaks associated with fresh produce implicated freshcut produce. If pathogens (bacteria) are present, the processing of fresh-cut may increase the risk of bacterial contamination and growth by breaking the natural exterior barrier of the produce. In addition, the high degree of handling in fresh-cut operations may increase the risk of cross contamination if adequate controls (e.g. adequate levels of free

chlorine in the rinse tank) are not in place.

Notes to observe: Look at sell by dates on package. Check for mold or foul odor. Follow directions on package. If practical, it may be well to rinse and spin greens again. Always, if you are cutting

NOTICE TO SWIMMING POOL OWNERS

Here is some very important information regarding any above ground or portable swimming pool.

1. All swimming pools more than 24 inches high require a permit.

- 2. All pools more than 24 inches high but less than 48 inches high require a four (4) foot high fence around the pool.
- 3. Pool pumps must have a GFCI receptacle (Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter)

produce or fruit, be sure to wash it before cutting. Always use clean cutting boards and knives.

Finally, make sure your hands are clean. Frequent hand washing should be as normal as breathing. The spread of illness can be avoided by frequent hand washing. Hand sanitizers are OK, but are not a substitute for hand washing.

RECYCLING NEWS

Thank you to all who recycle at the Liberty Recycling Center. Volunteers are needed to man the center on a monthly basis. Presently three groups share the work load. A fourth group would make the monthly cycle so much easier. Please, if your organization would like to make $100 + dollars for 6 \frac{1}{2}$ hours work a month, please stop and we will be glad to show you how easy it can be. We have recently purchased a platform scale to weigh our bundles of materials so we can broker our materials to over-the-road carriers for a larger profit. We continue to accept the following materials: Glass (clear, green, brown) bottles and jars. Please do not bring window glass, coffee cups, drinking glasses or candle jars. Corrugated cardboard, newspaper - Please remove the shiny ads and recycle with your magazines, Steel cans and aluminum cans, Plastic bottles and jars with a #1 or a #2 recycling symbol on the bottom only. The definition of a bottle or jar used by the recycling industry is that the neck or opening is smaller than the base. Microwave dishes, butter dishes, yogurt cups are wider at the opening than the base and are not recyclable in our area. The hours of operation are Wednesday evening 5:30 - 8:00 pm and Saturday 7:00 am - 11:00am. Please do NOT leave materials at any other time.


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SOAP BOX RACE SCHEDULED

Cola Barbecue Sauce

1-1/2 cups cola soda (not diet)

1 cup ketchup

1/4 cup vinegar

1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce

2 teaspoons paprika

2 teaspoons chili powder

1/8 teaspoon onion salt

1/8 teaspoon garlic salt

1 tablespoon finely minced garlic

1 tablespoon minced canned chipotle chili in adobo sauce (including sauce)

Combine all ingredients in a heavy saucepan and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for about 10 minutes. This sauce is great on all meats and vegetables. Refrigerate any leftover sauce.

Grilling Glaze

1/3 cup honey


1/3 cup pineapple-orange juice



Ice Cream Delights

Summer is the perfect time to enjoy ice cream! Cool down with these yummy frozen delights.

Angel Food Ice Cream Cake

1 angel food cake (8 inches) 1/2 gallon vanilla ice cream, slightly softened 2 quarts fresh strawberries Sugar to taste

Cut the cake in half; tear one half into small pieces and set aside. Cut the other half into 12-14 thin slices; arrange in the bottom of a wax paper lined 13" x 9" x 2" baking pan, overlapping as needed. Spread softened ice cream over cake, pressing down to smooth. Gently press the small cake pieces into the ice cream. Cover and freeze. Just before serving, slice strawberries and sweeten to taste. Cut dessert into squares and top with strawberries.

Fried Ice Cream

16 scoops vanilla ice cream 2 cups finely crushed graham crackers or vanilla wafers 1/2 tsp cinnamon 2 eggs 2 Tbs milk Oil for deep frying

Cover ice cream scoops with plastic wrap and freeze for two hours or until firm. In small bowl, combine graham cracker or vanilla wafer crumbs with cinnamon. Mix well. Quickly roll firm ice cream balls one at a time in crumb mixture. Freeze balls on baking sheet lined with wax paper for two more hours or until firm. In small bowl, beat eggs and milk. Quickly re-roll coated ice cream balls in egg mixture, then in crumb mix. Put balls back on lined baking sheet and freeze ice cream balls for an additional two hours or until firm. Pour oil three inches deep in deep fryer or heavy duty saucepan. Heat oil to 375 degrees F. Use slotted spoon to place one ice cream ball at a time into hot oil. Fry until coating begins to brown, 8 to 10 seconds on each side. Serve immediately.

FUN WITH CRYPTOGRAMS

Fun with Cryptograms What is a cryptogram? It is simply a puzzle based on a code--one that you must break to solve the puzzle. It is a phrase or quote where each letter has had another letter substituted for it. For example, in a particular phrase, every "a" may be changed to an "x" and every "z" may be substituted by an "m." Every letter in the phrase is changed and a different code is used for each individual cryptogram.

To illustrate, look at the simple letter substitution in the following cryptogram:

Puzzle: EZRW RW VF GSVTNCG XH V YDLNEXJDVT.

Solution: THIS IS AN EXAMPLE OF A CRYPTO-GRAM.

In this example, every "w" represents the letter "s," every "e" represents the letter "t," and so on. Letters are never substituted with themselves. You solve a cryptogram with a trial

and error process, guessing the letters as you go. And as with most puzzles, practice makes perfect!

Detect-a-Leak Week is

held annually every May. This is the perfect time to give your home a once over, checking for leaks that may be costing you money. Even a small leak can add up to hundreds of dollars a year and could damage surrounding fixtures, cabinets, or floors. One of the biggest culprits is the toilet. You often cannot tell if your toilet is leaking simply by examining it. Place a few drops of food coloring, just enough to slightly color the water, in the main tank. Let it sit for several hours, then check the toilet bowl. If you see the color in the bowl, you have a leaky toilet and it needs to be repaired. Check for dripping faucets, pipes, and connections by examining all plumbing in your home. Use a lightweight cloth to wipe around each connection. If your cloth becomes wet, you have leaky plumbing that needs to be repaired.

Don't forget to stop those leaks that you can control. Turn faucets off all the way. Don't let water run when you brush your teeth, and don't use your toilet as a wastebasket. Instead of throwing items such as tissues in the toilet and flushing, use a small wastebasket in your bathroom instead.

EXERCISING IN THE SUMMER HEAT

If you enjoy exercising outdoors, there is no reason to give it up when the weatherman is predicting a heat wave. You do, however, have to take some precautions. Follow these guidelines when exercising this Summer. You should plan on acclimating your body to increases in temperature gradually. Cut back on your regular routine and then gradually increase the amount of exercise you do over the next few weeks. It is not safe to exercise during extreme heat and/or humidity. Try to avoid the hottest part of the day, generally from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Wear light colored,

loose fitting, cotton clothing. Wear a hat and use sunscreen to protect you from sunburn. Be very aware of the dangers of dehydration. You should drink plenty of water before, during, and after exercise in warm weather. Your body can lose up to a quart of water an hour. It is possible to over-hydrate, so don't over-

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load your body on fluids. But you will need about one to two cups of fluid every 20 to 30 minutes of exercise, depending on the heat and your level of activity.

If you begin to feel weak, dizzy, or nauseous, you may have the first signs of heat exhaustion. You may also get a headache, notice that sweating stops, or feel overheated. At the first sign of any of these symptoms, stop exercising, move to a cooler location, and drink some water. If the symptoms persist, see a doctor immediately.
