2ND STREET COMMUNITY CENTER UPDATE

Construction will once again be happening at the 2nd Street Community Center. While the Borough was unsuccessful in its grant application to the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources Community Conservation Partnership Program, alternative sources of funding are being sought, and progress has been made.

SUN Area Career and Technology Center has agreed to take on the challenge of renovating the Community Room. During the 2009-2010 school year, students from various construction departments at SUN Area will be using the 2nd Street Community Center as their learning project. "I see this as a win/win situation for our 2nd Street project and the SUN Area students. It is said that when God closes a door somewhere he opens a window." commented Mayor Brosius. The Borough is responsible for the transportation of the students,

the materials, and the installation of a support beam.

As to the Gymnasium/Stage area, additional resources and partnerships are being researched. The Borough recently submitted an application to the Pennsylvania Conservation Corps. Should the project be accepted, the PCC will provide a crew and crew leader to renovate the Gymnasium/Stage and additional projects within the borough. Once again, the Borough would be responsible for the cost of the materials.

The S. Luther Savidge Foundation has awarded \$30,000 toward the Community Room project. Renovation funds have also been awarded by other community organizations including the Degenstein Foundation and the Sunbury Northumberland Community Trust. A Capital Campaign is underway for the additional funds needed to complete the 2nd Street Community Center.

THE ENGINE

The 2009 Pineknotter Day's choice to add to their train is the ENGINE. Celebrating the 25th anniversary of the North Shore Railroad headquartered in Northumberland, the engine will be painted the same as the North Shore Railroad Engines. The engine will be available as a "dummy" (non-powered, \$175), without sound effects (\$225) or with TMCC train sound effects (\$275) plus shipping and handling (\$12.50) if shipped. Due to the cost of this item, the engine must be paid in full at time of ordering. Orders must be received by March 31, 2009. Order forms may be picked up at the borough office. 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FLOOD PROTECTION REGULATIONS

ALWAYS CHECK WITH THE BOROUGH OFFICE BEFORE YOU BUILD ON, FILL, ALTER, OR REGRADE YOUR PROPERTY.

A permit is needed to ensure that such projects do not cause problems on other properties. Lots were originally designed so water would flow away from the building and along property lines to the street, storm sewer, or ditch. Fences, railroad ties, landscaping and re-grading block this flow. So do construction projects in the ditches or the floodplain.

NEW CONSTRUCTION REQUIRES PROPER PERMITS. New buildings in the floodplain must be protected from flood damage. The Borough's development regulations require that new residential buildings must be elevated 1½ feet above the base flood level. These regulations are designed to protect you and your neighbors. By getting the proper permits before you build, flooding and other drainage problems can be prevented.

The ordinance also requires that all substantial improvements and substantial damage to a building be treated as a new building. A project is "substantial" when the value of an addition, alteration, repair or reconstruction project exceeds 50% of the value of the existing building. In the case of an addition, only the addition must be protected. In the case of an improvement to the original building, the entire building must be protected.

DO NOT DUMP OR THROW ANYTHING INTO THE DITCHES OR BASINS. Dumping in our ditches and storage basins is a violation of Borough Code. Every piece of trash can contribute to fleeding. Every piece of trash can contribute to fleeding.

can accumulate and plug channels. If your property is next to a ditch or storage basin, please do your part in helping the drainage system work. Sweep or clean up your gutters to prevent blockages in the storm sewers. Pick up trash and fallen branches in the ditches. Remove snow and ice from the storm sewer.

If you see dumping or debris in the ditches or basins, filling or construction near property lot lines, or filling or construction in the floodplain without a permit sign posted, contact the Borough Office 570-473-3414. The debris or project may cause flooding on your property.

FLOOD INSURANCE

Most homeowners insurance policies do not cover a property for flood damage. The Borough of Northumberland participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Local insurance agents can sell an NFIP policy under rules and rates set by the Federal government. Any agent can sell a policy and all agents must charge the same rates. There are two types of flood insurance coverage; building coverage and contents coverage. Coverage for sump pump failure or sewer backup might be available as an addition to your homeowner's insurance policy. Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection. There is a 30 day waiting period before National Flood Insurance coverage takes effect.

2008 RECYCLING REPORT

Thanks to all who recycle at the Liberty Recycling Center. **In**

2008 the Liberty Recycling Center processed 270,000 lbs. of glass, cardboard, newspaper, magazines, steel cans and aluminum cans. A special thanks to the volunteers of the Lions clubs of Northumberland and Sunbury, the Northumberland – Point Township Kiwanis Club and Tom Wandishin and Steve Bucher who donated their time on behalf of the Shikellamy Football Boosters to staff the recycling center on Wednesdays and Saturdays. If you belong to a civic group with members interested in building the club's treasury speak to either Bill Gross or Darvin Straub about getting involved in this service to the community. You need to commit to thirteen Wednesdays and Saturdays in a year.

Several changes are under way for the future. **PPL has provided a container for recycling CFLs (compact fluorescent light bulbs)** so you can dispose of them properly. However, NO BROKEN BULBS will be accepted. Interstate Batteries has informed us that they can **only recycle lead acid batteries**. We are in the process of contacting a company to recycle rechargeable batteries and the small "flashlight " type batteries need to go into your trash.

As you have read many recycling centers have closed. The main reason is TRASH. People bring their trash and mix it in their materials to recycle, dump it off and run. Please read the signs and place only the correct materials in the containers provided. But now a new problem has developed. Newspaper, cardboard and magazines have dropped in value about \$100 a ton making the work much less rewarding but we hope to keep the center open if we can.

Our hours are: Wednesday 5:30-7:00~pm and Saturday 7:00 -11:00 am.

We recycle: Cardboard, Newspaper (shiny ads removed), Magazines and shiny newspaper ads, Clear, green, and brown glass jars and bottles, number 1 and 2 plastic jars and bottles, steel and aluminum cans, lead acid batteries, and CFL bulbs.

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


GET A HEAD START ON YOUR SPRING CLEANING!!

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JOINT COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UPDATE

The Steering Committee for the Northumberland/Point Township Joint Comprehensive Plan is finalizing its work on the draft of the plan.

Prior to the plan's adoption by the Northumberland Borough Council and the Point Township Board of Supervisors, two public review meetings will be held.

The first public meeting will be hosted by the planning commissions of the two municipalities. The second will be a public hearing hosted by the Borough Council and the Board of Supervisors. Once dates have been set, the meetings will be advertised in the Daily Item and on the website at

www.northumberlandborough.com.

Copies of the plan will be available for review at the Borough Office, the Point Township Building and the Priestley-Forsyth Memorial Library for at least 45 days between the planning commission public meeting and the public hearing.

Residents are encouraged to attend these meetings and voice their comments. Written comments will also be accepted at the municipal offices. All comments will be reviewed by the Borough and Township officials prior to the plan's adoption so any comments with significance may be included in the plan.

With the finalization of the comprehensive plan, the participating communities will have a blueprint for future growth that is coordinated and complementary to each other. The plan reviewed, revised and updated the 1985 joint comprehensive plan. A joint comprehensive plan and its use by the participating communities is viewed very favorably by state and federal funding sources.










Our Customers Always Come First

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In October of this year, Kim King, Youth Services Coordinator/Assistant Director and Dottie Fasold, Bookkeeper/Co-Manager, participated in the intensive four day Family Place Training. The Family Place curriculum assists in preparing children to become life long library users and in helping parents in becoming their child's first and most important teacher.

As part of the program, libraries redefine their youth spaces and promote the library as a family friendly destination. Libraries are no longer being thought of as a place to say, "Shh." Infants, toddlers and preschoolers are made to feel comfortable in a space specifically for them.

A key component of Family Place Libraries is the Parent-Child Workshop. The workshop is designed to give parents the opportunity to spend time with their toddlers in an educational and creative environment that is filled with toys and play equipment. The five week series looks like a toddler play group because children can choose the activities they wish to do while parents follow their lead. The workshop focuses on encouraging parents to read to their children early and often, reducing the sense of isolation that many parents feel when raising children, providing an opportunity for parents to interact with other parents, supporting the role of "parents as teachers," and establishing connections between professionals and parents.

Collaborating with Project ELECT, a teen parent and support program, the first Parent Child Workshop is planned for March 2009. Parent resources will be expanded in the library and other means of parent support will be offered to everyone in the community. This program is made possible through a grant from the Pennsylvania Library Association. Look for new learning toys, games, a parent resource area and a train table in the library's second floor children's area.

On April 18, King Street Park will be the place to be to see the King Penguin parade, penguin related activities and copies of the book *If I Were A Penguin* by Florence Minor. The event involves the Early Care & Education Coalition of the Susquehanna Valley United Way and Pennsylvania's

One Book Every Young Child program. Copies of the book will be available from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. that day. Visit the library for more information.



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Just to get you thinking about the summer, the library's Summer Reading Program will be the theme of "Be Creative @ Your Library" for preschool through middle school children and "Be Expressive @ Your Library" for teens. If you know of anyone who can help us to become creative, offer their talents, or would like to assist at summer reading, please contact Kim King, Youth Services Coordinator at 473-8201.

Also during the summer months, you will begin to see programs based around the book *Marley and Me* by John Grogan. The library will be working on activities with six other libraries in the area. The event will kickoff on August 22 with a Pet Parade in King Street Park. The author, John Grogan will be visiting the area as a culminating event on October 3 at Susquehanna University.

As you can see , the library is the place to come for fun, entertainment and enrichment. We enjoy being part of the commu-

nity and look forward to seeing you during the winter and spring months.

JOBS FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS

The Borough will again be hiring college students and collegebound high school seniors as part of the Summer Intern Program.

To be eligible, the student must receive a P.H.E.A.A. loan or grant. Interested students should contact the Borough Office after February 15th to obtain more information and application forms.

In the past, the borough has employed students to work at Liberty Splashland and with the Borough Crew. At Liberty Splashland, the students are employed as lifeguards, concession stand operators, maintenance, and front desk personnel. (Contact the YMCA to learn when lifeguard classes are scheduled.) Students working with the borough street crew help to cut grass, trim, paint crosswalks, and other property maintenance throughout the Borough. Students may earn up to \$2,500 during the summer months through this program.

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United States SHORT-TERM JOBS WITH LONG ensus -TERM RESULTS

The U.S. Census Bureau is already looking for job applicants to work for the 2010 Census. Peak hir-

ing will be from February 2009 through the end of May 2010 for temporary assignments, most lasting 5 to 10 weeks.

By working on this once-a-decade population headcount, residents have an opportunity to be a part of history. Conducted every decade since 1790, the constitutionally mandated census affects community funding and determines representation in Congress.

"The jobs, which offer competitive wages and flexible schedules, also allow people to work in their neighborhoods and for their neighborhoods," said Marilia Matos, the Census Bureau's associate director for field operations. "We hire locally, and an accurate count means a fair distribution of money for schools, roads, neighborhood improvements and elderly care in your community.'

In 2009, the Census Bureau will hire about 140,000 people to help update the Census Bureau's address list. The workers will use GPSequipped hand-held computers to verify, add and delete addresses, and they will be paid for training. By the end of the 2010 Census, the Census Bureau will have employed about 1.4 million temporary workers in communities across the country. Employees will update the Census Bureau's address list, interview people who do not respond to the census by mail and perform other assignments vital to the national count.

By 2010, there will be more than 310 million people living in an estimated 130 million households across the country and everyone must be counted in order to ensure seats are apportioned in the U.S. House of Representatives and federal and state funding is distributed fairly.

The U.S. population is more diverse than ever before, with people speaking a record number of languages. As a result, in many areas the Census Bureau will need to hire people who are bilingual.

"If we do not obtain an accurate count in 2010, each person residing in the United States will be affected," Matos said. "Everyone deserves to have a voice and be counted, and by working for the 2010 Census, you will be directly involved with ensuring that happens."

Most positions require U.S. citizenship, a driver's license and use of a vehicle, and each applicant will undergo a background check. A short-term job with long-term results, 2010 Census positions offer competitive wages and flexible schedules.

During 2008, the Northumberland Police Department logged 3,199 calls for service, the above numbers reflect the more common incidents logged by the department. 55 non-traffic citations and 408 traffic citations were issued during the year. Over 200 misdemeanor and felony criminal charges were filed for various violations of the law some of which included attempted homicide, aggravated assault and possession and selling of illicit drugs.
