The Northumberland County Conservation District presented the Swank Outstanding Conservation Organization Award to the Susquehanna River Cleanup Project on August 1st. The Swank Conservation Awards are presented annually to an organization or youth group in Northumberland County who has accomplished the most in natural resource conservation.




On May 4th, volunteers gathered to skim the banks of the West Branch of the Susquehanna River from Milton to Sunbury . Collected was 960 lbs of scrap metal (recycled), 1500 lbs. of recycled materials, 2200 lbs. of waste (non recyclables), and 30 tires (also recycled). That's

Getting up to speed- As we have seen pipes collapse and our stream banks erode, it's obvious that Liberty Hollow Run has seen increased flows during wet weather due to increased land development in its drainage area. Land development, which increases impervious surfaces, leads to increased quantities and speeds at which rainfall runoff flows through our local streams. Along its way, that runoff not only picks up speed which causes erosion and eats away at the stream beds, but also picks up pollutants like fertilizers, oils, grease, litter, & animal waste which ultimately make their way to the Susquehanna River. In the fall of 2011, Liberty Hollow Run flooded to such an extent that it submerged Liberty Splashland! One approach that the borough is taking to alleviate these unwanted flows, is analyzing potential green infrastructure (GI) opportunities. GI is becoming a more viable option for municipal authorities as grant monies are more readily available for GI projects than they are for traditional storage and conveyance projects.

The Problems-



The Project- Hazen and Sawyer, P.C. will be evaluating various green infrastructure alternatives, and developing conceptual designs of those practices which will best suit our Liberty Hollow Run Watershed. The boundary of this watershed can be seen in the map above outlined by red. This is the area from which problematic flows are being generated. Because of a willingness to implement green infrastructure best management practices, the borough has been awarded a grant opportunity to analyze cost effective, technically sound, environmentally sound, and community friendly solutions.

N FROM THE FIRE CHIEF

October is always fire prevention month. It is a busy time of year for most folks, and it is especially busy for the NFD this year! October 9th we will be visiting the elementary schools in the Borough and the Township, and we are also scheduled to be visiting with the various pre-schools. These sessions with the children are a CRITICAL part of our mission and I'm happy to say that the day is shaping up to be a great one with lots of our members available to attend. It is a great thing that they are able to take vacation days or are fortunate that their employment allows them a flexible schedule.

Fire prevention activities include lessons on "Stop, Drop, & Roll", calling 9-1-1, and other topics directed at preventing and dealing with emergencies at home. It is also a good opportunity to display and demonstrate the latest in equipment that we use to serve the community. During my career, the emergency response industry made quite a shift in placing emphasis not just on teaching the children potentially life-saving skills, but making those young folks into "mini-instructors" of sorts to go home and school their parents, guardians, and siblings. We provide take-home materials to students to help pass

along and set the message with adult members of the community. The message does get thru, as many times over the course of the year we interact with younger folks who are very happy to remind us of the things we teach them!

In addition we have 3 separate week-long training courses scheduled for October. These schools are offered to our members at no cost and get at the finer details of vehicle rescue participating with the ladder company. Folks can participate as much or as little as they are able. We have been participating in a cooperative effort with the Sunbury, Shamokin Dam, Upper Augusta, and a few other Fire Departments to bring high-quality training courses that are not often offered locally to our collective memberships. The program has gone phenomenally, resulting in several BRAND NEW members completing their basic firefighting training as well as other members completing courses they might not have otherwise had access to. In addition, I'm aware of another of our newest members completing the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) program, and the list goes on. I certainly thank all of their members for their dedication! Thru external and especially internal sources, the NFD has one of the best firefighter training scheduled in the community. It truly will be a busy month. Our membership drive is still underway and I'm happy to report that we have had several new members come out to help, some mentioned above, and a few others in other capacities. In reality we still need more folks so please help us spread the word.


One group of folks I do not believe I have mentioned before in this venue is Junior Firefighters. Candidates can start in the junior program as young as 14 years old. From 14-16 these young people participate in a supervised training capacity only. At 16 years of age, juniors can begin to respond to emergencies on a limited basis and act in various support functions, still focused on training and honing their skills. The



goal is to turn out trained, qualified firefighters at 18 years of age, or a senior member. Juniors are supervised under all of the PA State Child Labor Laws, and in addition to the law, the NFD's mandate is that school and academic excellence come first! It's not unheard of for a senior member to tutor a junior. Currently we have a fine group of 4 dedicated firefighters under the age of 18. We look forward to them becoming our future. Perhaps you know a bright young person who would like join their ranks?

Thank you all for your continued support! Remember that the end of daylight savings time, or Fire Prevention Week, or any other reminder that you can use on a 6 month basis to check the batteries in those smoke detectors is a GREAT investment in your safety and the safety of your family!



Administrative Assistant Wendy Reigel As many residents are aware, I previously worked for the Police Department in the mid to late 90's when an unforeseen circumstance (lack of funds) sadly caused the borough to indefinitely furlough my duties here. I have prayed for the day that the department would need the services again, and am pleased to have been chosen, once again, to walk the beat with such a Professional and Dedicated Chief and team of Officers.

I am a mother of two, a daughter age 32 and a son age 30. I helped raise a niece now age 35 as a daughter. My seven grandchildren age from 7 months to 16. Being a previous business owner, I clearly understand the importance of family, children and business safety.

My future goals, as time allows, are to reinstate the Crime Prevention Program for Home and Business Security, Child Safety, Adult Fraud, and the Community Crime Watch Program.

New meters have been purchased and installed; current meters have been repaired. Please inform the police or borough office if a meter is not functioning properly.

Meter District Permits are available for purchase for \$20, residential or business. Permits must be purchased at the beginning of the month, and are available at the borough office.

Be advised regarding the Street Sweeper, all residents will be ticketed unless you inform the police department that your vehicle is



in-operable to be moved on street sweeping days. In addition, you may place a white cloth or bag in the driver's side window to allow the street sweeper to clearly see the vehicle is disabled. *Notes on windshields will not be accepted*.

As fall and winter are upon us, please be reminded to keep all streets and sidewalks clear of fallen debris i.e. leaves, snow and ice. 
LEAF PICK-UP


This fall the Priestley Chapel Associates will replace the two signs at the chapel – known as the Wayside Pulpit. The signs announce
