# **GRANTS AWARDED**

Our community is fortunate to have several local foundations that support activities and projects for our residents. Several grants have recently been awarded to our local groups.

#### Thank you, S. Luther Savidge Charitable Trust!

The Borough is the recipient of several grants awarded by the trustees of the S. Luther Savidge Charitable Trust. The


awards include \$3,000 for the Howling Hollow Dog Park (\$6,000 was also awarded in 2012); \$2,500 for entertainment in King Street Park and at Lemonade Day; \$2,500 for landscaping at the 2<sup>nd</sup> Street Community Center; and \$5,000 for new holiday decorations and lights for King Street Park.

Liberty Splashland has received \$1,700 from the Anselmo trustees to purchase equipment for life-guard instruction and toward free admission passes for Shikellamy Elementary School students. # Northumberland Fire Department Seeking Support For New Rehab Unit

Fire Department Rehab Units are a vital firefighting service on the fire ground, providing firefighters and other emergency personnel with immediate medical attention including rehydration, treatment for smoke inhalation, and the prevention of such life-threatening conditions as heatstroke and heart attack. Heart attacks cause nearly half of all in line-of-duty firefighter deaths each year, and nearly a quarter of the injuries are attributed to over exertion and strain. When emergency responders become fatigued, their ability to operate safely is impaired.



Chances are you have not needed the fire company and hopefully never will, but by chance, if you needed the Northumberland Fire Department to respond to your needs, we would respond quickly, as we have so many times in the past. The troubling news is that we cannot maintain

such a high level of service without your help.

The community can give back to those who serve them by financial contributions as well as in-kind donations such as: Blankets, Towels, Flashlights, Ice Packs, Warm packs, 6 foot tables, Box coolers, Gas cans, Generator, String lights, Round Coolers, Camping chairs, Stainless Steel Coffee Maker, Cool Mist Fan, Extension Cords, Basic First Aid Supplies, 10x10 Tent with sides, and Heaters.

#### THE BENEFITS OF RAIN BARRELS



A rain barrel is a container that captures and stores rainwater draining from your roof. Barrels usually range from 50 to 80 gallons and have a spigot for filling watering cans and a connection for a soaker hose. Combining the use of rain barrels with appropriate plant selection and mulching promotes water conservation. Rain barrels benefit your home, garden and community.

**Money Saver** Rain barrels save homeowners money on their water bills. Garden and lawn irrigation accounts for 40 percent of residential water use during the summer, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. By using rain barrels, homeowners can save 1,300 gallons of water during the growing season. The Southwest Florida Water Management District states that a half-inch of rain fills a typical 50- to 55-gallon rain barrel. Connecting multiple barrels maximizes rain capture. Rain barrels provide a free water source for irrigation and ease reliance on the city's water supply.

**Healthy Plants and Soil** Tap water contains inorganic ions and fluoride compounds that accumulate in the soil over time and potentially harm plant roots and microorganisms in the soil. Rainwater does not contain the same additives found in tap water. It benefits plants in your garden by cleaning the soil of salt buildup, thereby promoting an environment conducive to root development.

**Reduction of Runoff** Rain barrels help reduce the flow of storm runoff. When it rains, runoff picks up soil, fertilizer, oil, pesticides and other contaminants from hard surfaces and landscapes. Storm runoff is not treated and flows directly into streams, lakes and other bodies of water nearby. Runoff fertilizers increase algae growth in lakes, and excess soil alters the habitat for fish. Bacteria can even make lakes and oceans dangerous for recreational activities. Rain barrels capture water that would have swept over a paved surface or lawn, thereby minimizing runoff pollutants. # PUT YOUR CAR KEYS BESIDE YOUR BED AT NIGHT

Tell your spouse, your children, your neighbors, your parents, your Dr.'s office, the check-out girl at the market, everyone you run across. Put your car keys beside your bed at night.

If you hear a noise outside your home or someone trying to get in your house, just press the panic button for your car. The alarm will be set off, and the horn will continue to sound until either you turn it off or the car battery dies.

Next time you come home for the night and you start to put your keys away, think of this: It's a security alarm system that you probably already have and requires no installation. Test it. It will go off from most everywhere inside your house and will keep honking until your battery runs down or until you reset it with the button on the key fob chain. It works if you park in your driveway or garage. If your car alarm goes off when someone is trying to break into your house, odds are the burglar/rapist won't stick around. After a few seconds all the neighbors will be looking out their windows to see who is out there and sure enough the criminal won't want that. And remember to carry your keys while walking to your car in a parking lot. The alarm can work the same way there. This is something that should really be shared with everyone. Maybe it could save a life or a sexual abuse crime.

#### P.S.

I am sending this to everyone I know because I think it is fantastic. Would also be useful for any emergency, such as a heart attack, where you can't reach a phone. My Mom has suggested to my Dad that he carry his car keys with him in case he falls outside and she doesn't hear him. He can activate the car alarm and then she'll know there's a problem. 
# VAN WAGNER "HARD COAL" PROGRAM AND CONCERT





## NORTHUMBERLAND BOROUGH RECIPIENT OF CHESAPEAKE BAY TRUST GRANT

In August of 2011, Tropical Storm Irene wreaked havoc along the East Coast. Northumberland was spared the damage that many of its neighbors experienced. Unfortunately, it did leave Liberty Splashland a muddy mess. Water from the hill sections poured into Liberty Hollow, filling the pool with mud and water, and causing a storm water pipe to collapse along side the pool area. Estimates to replace the broken pipe are over \$100,000. However, repairing the pipe does not address the larger issue — the quantity of water the pipe is required to carry and the damage caused before the water reaches the pipe.


In March, the Borough, with the assistance of the Hazen and Sawyer engineering firm, grant application to Chesapeake Bay Trust's "Green Streets, Green Jobs, Green program. The program focuses on urban green infrastructure projects that lead to

improved local and Bay water quality in the Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Washington D.C., West Virginia, and Virginia portions of the Chesapeake Bay. The Borough applied for the design of conceptual plans for the Liberty Hollow watershed. The project will result in green street/ green stormwater infrastructure plans in which multiple low-impact development best management practices, such as rain gardens, pervious pavement, bioretention cells, street trees, and bioswales, are employed. Implementation of the plans will reduced the quantity and improve the quality of the water entering the Susquehanna River. The CBT awarded \$30,000 to the project, fully funding the cost. The Borough Council has the grant agreement under review, and will be voting to approve the contract at their next meeting on June 25th.

The Liberty Hollow watershed encompasses approximately 170 acres from the top of the hill to its end at the Susquehanna River. Hazen and Sawyer engineers will be analyzing the watershed over the summer months. Public participation is a component of the application. Two public meetings will be scheduled; one this fall to review the preliminary design and one next spring to publicize the final design. After the design is completed, the Borough intends to apply to the next G3 grant round for implementation funds.

## HOW TO WRITE A CHECK

This article is at the request of a local tax collector.

Write the date at the top of the check where it says "date." It can be in any format (ex: 11/14/07, 11-14-07, November 11, 2007, etc.)

Write the name of the person or company receiving the check on the line that begins with "Pay to the Order of" or "Payable to." Make sure to use proper names. Even if it is your friend, don't use nicknames or they may have trouble cashing it. When paying a bill, companies will usually tell you specifically who to make the check out to, so pay attention!

Write the amount you are paying in numbers in the space (usually the right side of the check) that begins with "\$" (ex: 101.55).

**Write that amount in words** on the remaining line before the word "Dollars." Use a fraction for amounts less than \$1. Draw a line to fill any space between the amount and the word "Dollar." Example: One hundred one and 55/100------ Dollars. If there are no cents, write xx over the fraction. Example: If the amount is \$100, write One hundred and xx/100----- Dollars.

**Sign the check** (usually bottom right side). Use the same spelling, initials, etc. that are printed at the top of your check.

Write a memo (usually on the bottom left side). For bills, you should write down a reference or account number in this area. The company will usually tell you what to put on this line. For anything else, this line is optional. You may want to write "concert tickets" or "rent" so you remember what the check is for.

**Use blue or black ink.** Do not use colored inks as they do not image well and can cause processing problems.



#### **Questions and Answers**

# Has PPL Electric Utilities increased the scope of its vegetation management work?

Yes. The October snowstorm of 2011 and Hurricane Sandy in October demonstrated more needed to be done to help prevent outages resulting from trees growing too close to the power lines. That includes larger transmission lines that move high-voltage electricity over long distances as well as local power lines that carry lowervoltage power from substations directly to homes and businesses.

#### What are the statistics to back up this work?

In 2011 and 2012, about 70 percent of storm related outages were tree-related. In fact, in those two years, tree-related outages on our lower-voltage distribution impacted 1 million customers.

# You've asked to remove a tree on my property that is not in the power line right of way. Why?

Sometimes, trees outside the right of way threaten our line because they are likely to fall due to disease, prior storm damage, or other factors. In these cases, we get permission of the property owner to remove the tree.

# How can the average customer help when it comes to power lines and vegetation management?

The biggest single thing customers can do is plant the right tree in the right place. The mature height of the tree must be considered when power lines are near.
