LIBERTY SPLASHLAND IN TROUBLE

In its inception in 1976 the Northumberland Pool was a source of pride for the community. A simpler time, when stay-at-home moms took rambunctious children to swim to burn off energy. When backyard swimming pools were not common place and kids had fewer options for their attentions. The pool was very successful and self-sufficient, built and funded by the very "Pineknotters" themselves.

However, these times have long passed, the pool has been running in the red more often than the black. The community has gotten older; schools have seen a decline in population. Labor costs increase yearly, but more importantly the dynamics of families have changed. Families relying on daycare is the norm, not the exception.

Video games are more popular than playing outdoors. Kids text instead of hang-out. Sports no longer have seasons, and are now played year-round. Seldom are seen bicycles parked outside of children's homes or pickup games in parks. Times have changed.

With deepened hearts and careful consideration, hours of deliberation and research we find that the Northumberland Pool is dying a very slow and expensive death. Without a major infusion of sustainable income and reliable volunteers, our recommendation will be to close the facility.

First, we must realize why it cost so much to run the pool.

Labor costs, lifeguards receive over \$9/hour to compete with other pools; teenage lifeguards are hard to find and keep. The pool closes in mid-August because college students return to school and high schools begin their fall sports practices.

Other successful pools are actually not successful at all. Sunbury and Lewisburg Pools both have a major contributor that sustain their pools. We are very thankful and grateful for the donations we receive from Joseph J Anselmo Sr. Trust, S. Luther Savidge Charitable Trust, the Degenstein Foundation, the Roy H Moyer Community Trust and others. They simply are not enough to sustain the yearly expenses let alone pay for the extensive and expensive maintenance required.

Water costs are exuberant. In 2017 it cost over \$17,000 just in water. The Pool is 40+ years old, there are small leaks everywhere, evaporation and daily splashing contribute to water loss. Our concession stand income of \$14,979.02 does not even cover our basic water costs.

State Regulations: Our pool is required to have 4 lifeguards on duty, at all times, and 1 for the water slide. We don't consistently have enough people visiting the pool to pay for 5 lifeguards plus 1 to cover breaks. 2017's payroll was \$60,182. Chemical requirements to treat the 309,000+ gallons of water were \$8,034 in 2017. Local well water cannot be used as it contains iron, which adds another layer of difficulty to the current required chemical treatment. With 2017 season admission fees of \$16,890, it's simply an unsustainable model.

Reducing cost in general is unrealistic. Management does its best to keep costs as low as possible already. Our lifeguard requirements are state mandated, the leaks are difficult to find much less fix.

We don't attract the numbers. Even though the bowl slide attracts out -of-town visitors, its primary users live locally. Nor can the pool compete with all the recreation options available. A count was started on the number of private pools and stopped after 30 which was just in the hill section.

The bottom line, the Pool is too large and too old to be sustained by the current number of regular users.

Then, we need to analyze the options.

Option #1 Recreation Tax: The Borough's current Recreation tax of 1.0 mil (approximately \$26,800) is based on property values and paid only by property owners, revenue budgeted for the pool is \$11,200. Other revenue received from this tax is budgeted for Pineknotter Park baseball field, the playground, King Street Park, and special events. The rate for the recreation tax could be increased. Over time, we could improve our playgrounds, the dog park, make major improvements to the pool, assist in the pools annual costs, create a walk/bike paths and potentially assist local events. Think of all the possibilities. Since Boro tax dollars are used to bail out the pool, aren't we already paying a pool tax as part of our tax? Point Township contributes \$2,000 to the pool budget.

Option #2 Simply Close the Pool: At this time, we are not recommending this option but it does have merit. A one-year infusion of income and volunteers will not correct the maintenance and financial issues. A 5- to 10-year plan with both committed monetary pledges and volunteers is required or the slow financial death of the pool will continue.

Option #3 Get the Community involved: Standing committees of 17857 residents committed to fund raising, maintenance/physical improvements, and marketing. We need ideas, but more importantly we need boots-on-the-ground volunteers. We need both leaders and laborers, from the Borough and Point Township.

Finally, a decision must be made.

Ultimately, the Borough Council will decide the fate of Liberty Splashland. While their role is to weigh all issues from a big picture perspective, their decisions should reflect the feelings and desires of their constituents. The Community Development Committee invites all interested parties to attend the next meeting on November 13th at 7:00 pm at the 2nd Street Community Center. While the pool is a Borough-owned facility and is its primary subsidizer, it serves Point Township residents as well. If you are willing to be a boots-on-the-ground volunteer, we will welcome your attendance.

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CHRIST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH'S COMMUNITY GARDEN & BLESSING BOX

You may have noticed a few new things growing by the Christ United Methodist Church (CUMC) on Front and King Streets this summer.

The Community Garden was started to simply share God's bounty with everyone! There are no income limits and no amount on how much you can take.

Produce is placed on the stand near the flagpole on the King Street side of the park, free for for anyone who would like fresh veggies at their meal table. This year's harvest included sweet corn (which some claim is the best they ever had!), eggplant, brussels sprouts, zucchini, hot peppers, green peppers, banana peppers, tomatoes, cilantro, dill,

basil, green beans, and fresh cut flowers.

Next year's plans for the gardens are already in the works! The CUMC family and community partners will be working on...

- Preparing the beds for composting during the fall and winter months.
- Signage to be installed with the CUMC kiddos' artistic touches!
- Install brick pathways.

- Handcrafted stepping stones will be made to be included in the paths throughout the garden.
- Garden expansion. The new footprint will double the garden's current size allowing for a more diverse crop selection and more produce for next year.
- A stone prayer wall will be built for anyone to utilize complete with lighting, a bench, and landscaping.

The CUMC Blessing Box has also been added as yet another outreach to the community. Blessing boxes come in many different sizes offering a

variety of items like non-perishable food goods, cleaning supplies, personal hygiene products, diapers, and more.

CUMC encourages anyone in the community to "Take what you need and leave what you can." The Box is located right next to the Community Garden's produce stand.





John Moore will present "The defiant Northumberland editor vs. President John Adams." Thursday Nov 16th 7 pm—Hunter House

In 1798 the U.S. government enacted the Alien and Sedition laws, which, among other things, made it illegal to criticize the President of the United States. These laws didn't sit well with Thomas Cooper, editor of the Northumberland Gazette. In June 1799 he published blistering criticism of the president. One of his readers sent the article to the U.S. government. In April 1800, Cooper stood trial in Philadelphia, charged with libeling Adams.

Convicted, Cooper spent six months in jail. A retired newspaper editor, Moore will provide details of the case and tell why the news media today enjoys the freedom to criticize our government.

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

2017-18 Hunting Guide Available Online for Free

The Pennsylvania Game Commission's 2017-18 Hunting Guide is now available to view and print online. Important updates in this year's guide include those related to the use of semiautomatic rifle permits



for small game and furbearers; pheasant hunters needing permits; select split seasons and new boundaries; an earlier start to archery bear season; select shorter fall turkey seasons; and eliminating the post-Christmas grouse season.

The annual digest, which has long been given out to each hunting and furtaker license buyer, is only being offered for free online this year and to students attending Hunter-Trapper Education courses as a cost-savings measure. To accommodate

license buyers who are unable to print digests at home, a limited number have been made available for purchase.

FLOOD INFORMATION

Properties in Northumberland's floodplain are subject to three flood problems:

Overbank Flooding: Flooding of both the West Branch and the North Branch of the Susquehanna River. Flooding presents a safety hazard. Velocities can be as high as 6 or 7 feet per second — so fast that the flood will wash people off their feet in only $\frac{1}{2}$ foot of floodwaters.

Local Drainage: There are several areas of local drainage problems where storm water collects and does not drain away. Sometimes, flooding is aggravated by debris that has been carelessly thrown into the channel.

Sewer Backup: With no place to go, sewers back up and flow into the lowest opening in the sewer line. Northumberland has had basement flooding caused by sewer backups.

FLOOD PROOFING a house means altering it so floodwaters will not cause damage. Different flood proofing techniques are appropriate for different types of buildings.

FLOOD INSURANCE is highly recommended because no flood proofing measure is 100% foolproof. Most homeowners insurance policies do not cover a property for flood damage. Additional information is available at the Borough Office or at northumberlandborough.com. Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection. There is a 30-day waiting period before National Flood Insurance coverage takes effect. Contact your insurance agent for more information.

FLOOD PROTECTION REGULATIONS Lots were originally designed so water would flow away from the building and along property lines to the street, storm sewer, or ditch. Fences, railroad ties, landscaping and re-grading block this flow. So do construction projects in the ditches or the floodplain. ALWAYS CHECK WITH THE BOROUGH OR TOWNSHIP OFFICE BEFORE YOU BUILD ON, FILL, ALTER, OR REGRADE YOUR PROPERTY. A permit is needed to ensure that such projects do not cause problems on other properties.

SAFETY TIPS Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Don't drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out. Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.

Be alert for gas leaks. Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use a generator or extension and provided management.

Be alert for gas leaks. Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use a generator or other gasoline powered machine outdoors. The same goes for camping stoves. Clean everything that got wet.

ELEVATION CERTIFICATES New construction and substantial improvements to buildings on the floodplain requires a FEMA Elevation Certificate. Elevation certificates are on file at Borough Office.
