



Chapel Organ Repair Campaign

This year the Priestley Chapel Associates (PCA) is kicking off a campaign to raise funds to substantially repair the historic John Wind Organ in Priestley Chapel. Although the organ has been maintained since its last restoration 35 years ago, conservation is now necessary to re-establish its original tuning.

Work is needed to:

- repair the 24 wooden pipe tuning stoppers and flap tuners
- replace one or more of the wooden pipes, and
- reform misshapen metal pipes.



NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY & HUNTER HOUSE MUSEUM



Historical society to visit 1798 Point Township home

Dave and Colleen Ruths will host the September 20 meeting of the Northumberland County Historical Society at their late 18th century fieldstone home in Point Township.

They will explain how a dendrochronologist recently


determined that the two-story dwelling was built around 1798 by studying the wood used in the original construction. "He took 10 samples – eight in the basement and two in the attic," Dave said.

By using a timeline based on tree-ring dating, dendrochronologists can calculate the approximate age of old structures. The meeting will start at 6:30 p.m. The Ruths reside at 345 Epler Road, Point Township.

Kathleen Van Schuyler will address the society's October 18 meeting. Kathleen's interest in her family's genealogy prompted her recently to travel to Salem, Mass., and visit the place where one of her ancestors, the Rev. George Burroughs, was hanged for witchcraft in 1692.

At the November 15 meeting, Daniel Schwalm will tell about Hessians soldiers who settled in Pennsylvania following the American Revolutionary War. One of these soldiers was Schwalm's own ancestor, Johannes Schwalm, who was captured by American troops at the Battle of Trenton in December 1776.

The October and November meetings will be held at the society's headquarters at 1150 N. Front St., Sunbury. They will begin at 7 p.m. Refreshments will follow the program. For more information, call 570-286-4083 or visit www.northumberlandcountyhistoricalsociety.org

The Sunday of Memorial Day weekend - May 27- was the first of two



free fishing days in the Common-wealth. The second is Independence Day - Wednesday, July 4. Fish-for-Free Days allow anyone residents and non-residents – to legally fish in Pennsylvania without a fishing license.

From 12:01 a.m. to 11:59 p.m., no fishing license is needed to fish in Pennsylvania's waterways. All other fishing regulations apply.

To make the fishing experience more convenient on the Fish-for-Free days, people can borrow equipment from dozens of fishing tackle loaner sites across the state. Many of the sites are right at state parks, which are always a popular place for visitors. Loaner sites are also available at county parks and some public libraries



Are You Owed Unclaimed Property?

The Pennsylvania Treasury Department is currently holding more than \$3.2 billion in unclaimed property.

Unclaimed property is any financial asset that has been left inactive by the owner for a period of three years or more. The most common kinds of unclaimed property include

savings and checking accounts, uncashed checks, unclaimed insurance benefits and items abandoned in forgotten safe deposit boxes.

The Treasury is required to advertise the names and addresses of unclaimed property owners in their last known county of residence, but only if the property is valued in excess of \$250. State officials are also cautioning individuals to be wary of services or "finders" that charge costly fees to help locate unclaimed property.

There is no need to pay a private service to submit a claim when there is a FREE and more effective way to conveniently determine if the state is holding some of your money. To search

Pennsylvania's unclaimed property online database, go to the Treasury Department's website, patreasury.gov, and follow the simple instructions.

FLOOD INFORMATION

Properties in Northumberland's floodplain are subject to three flood problems:

Overbank Flooding: Flooding of both the West Branch and the North Branch of the Susquehanna River. Flooding presents a safety hazard. Velocities can be as high as 6 or 7 feet per second – so fast that the flood will wash people off their feet in only ½ foot of floodwaters.

Local Drainage: There are several areas of local drainage problems where storm water collects and does not drain away. Sometimes, flooding is aggravated by debris that has been carelessly thrown into the channel.

Sewer Backup: With no place to go, sewers back up and flow into the lowest opening in the sewer line. Northumberland has had basement flooding caused by sewer backups.

FLOOD PROOFING a house means altering it so floodwaters will not cause damage. Different flood proofing techniques are appropriate for different types of buildings.

FLOOD INSURANCE is highly recommended because no flood proofing measure is 100% foolproof. Most homeowners insurance policies do not cover a property for flood damage. Additional information is available at the Borough Office or at northumberlandborough.com. Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection. There is a 30-day waiting period before National Flood Insurance coverage takes effect. Contact your insurance agent for more information.

FLOOD PROTECTION REGULATIONS Lots were originally designed so water would flow away from the building and along property lines to the street, storm sewer, or ditch. Fences, railroad ties, landscaping and re-grading block this flow. So do construction projects in the ditches or the floodplain. ALWAYS CHECK WITH THE BOROUGH OR TOWNSHIP OFFICE BEFORE YOU BUILD ON, FILL, ALTER, OR REGRADE YOUR PROPERTY. A permit is needed to ensure that such projects do not cause problems on other properties.

SAFETY TIPS Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Don't drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out. Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.

Be alert for gas leaks. Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use a generator or other gasoline powered machine outdoors. The same goes for

or other gasoline powered machine outdoors. The same goes for camping stoves. Clean everything that got wet.

ELEVATION CERTIFICATES New construction and substantial improvements to buildings on the floodplain requires a FEMA Elevation Certificate. Elevation certificates are on file at Borough Office.

No one likes seeing, smelling, or stepping in dog poop, but did you know that unscooped poop presents serious issues for water quality and human health?

• Pet waste is raw sewage. It can transmit bacteria, viruses, and

other pathogens to humans and other animals, including tapeworm, roundworm, E. Coli, giardia, salmonella, and more.

- Four out of ten U.S. households have at least one dog, and four out of ten of those dog owners don't pick up after their dogs.
- Unscooped poop in yards, parks, and sidewalks gets into our lakes, streams and rivers, even into groundwater.
- Nutrients in pet waste cause excess algae in lakes and streams. This limits the light available to aquatic plants. Also, as algae decays it uses up oxygen needed by fish.

What You Can Do

- Scoop weekly to keep your yard clean. Backyard poop is a big problem.
- Keep your dog on leash. Then stoop and scoop that poop. Every time.
- Bring baggies when you walk your dog, plus extras to share.
- Seal the bags and toss them in the trash.
- Never use pet waste in your garden or compost. It is not a natural fertilizer.

To all dog owners who keep their dogs on leash and scoop the poop, we say "thank you"! You are protecting water quality, wildlife, and the well-being of your fellow humans. Keep up the good work and give yourself a nice pat. You deserve it. From Salt Lake County website.

THE STORMWATER CONNECTION

It is estimated that more than half of the pollution in our nations waterways comes from stormwater runoff. When water flows across our lawns, driveways, and roads (rain, melting snow, etc.) it picks up fertilizers, pet waste, engine oil, and more. It's called stormwater runoff and the pollutants it carries are transported straight to our streams, rivers, and lakes. No filters. No treatment.

The storm drain system flows directly to

our local waterways. This differs from the sanitary sewer system that your house is connected to, where wastewater is sent to a treatment plant. Even soil can be considered a pollutant when excess sediment washes into the storm drain and clouds up our waterways.

Stormwater runoff is a major cause of water pollution in our nation's waterways, and one that is extremely difficult to regulate. We all contribute to pollutants in runoff, and we can all help protect our water quality.

Tips for keeping pollution out of the storm drain:

- Adjust sprinkler heads to spray only lawn and garden areas, not onto driveways and roads.
- Keep fertilizers and other garden chemicals off driveways and sidewalks. Sweep up any excess.
- Use only as much fertilizer as needed, preferably natural/ biodegradable products.
- Use natural/non-toxic methods to control garden pests. If pesticides or herbicides are needed, check with local nurseries for products that are registered for use near water.
- Use native and drought-tolerant plants to reduce the need for fertilizer and watering.
- Mow lawns at least 3" high for deeper and healthier roots that
 reduce irrigation needs and runoff potential.
 - Mulch or compost yard debris (grass, leaves, etc.) and keep them out of the storm drain.
 - Never dump household toxics (paint, cleaning products, engine oil, antifreeze, pesticides, medications etc.) down the storm drain
 - Wash your car on the lawn to keep soapy water out of the storm drain and give your lawn a nice soak! Even better, use a commercial carwash.
 - Sweep dirt into the garden (don't wash down the storm drain); put debris in the trash.
 - Minimize impervious surfaces on your property.
 - Drain pool or spa water onto a lawn that can absorb it without runoff. To drain into your sewer clean-out (not storm drain!), contact your local sewer department for regulations. Or call a professional.
 - Use sediment controls during construction, such as silt fences or straw bales, to keep soils onsite and out of the storm drain.


